Remembering Jack Van Vooren

Jack Van Vooren knew just about every Sailor and their family, civil servant and contractor on base and we all knew him. No matter when or where you saw him, he had on his Marine Corps liberty attire: Dockers, belt, collared shirt, and warm friendly smile. He was quick to greet everyone with a firm handshake and always had something nice to say to you. A quiet man, Jack spoke volumes with his actions and

attitude. That is why news of Jack's passing came as a shock. In mere moments the carefree activities of the base such as an intramural football game, dimmed due to the sad news. Word traveled fast and Sailors as far as NAS Lemoore received the notice and passed the word. Within a day, people all over the region and all over the nation knew that Jack was with us no more. Jack might have actually been surprised at all of the fuss. He was a simple man with simple values.

On Tuesday, November 23, at 1500 in the base chapel family, friends, coworkers, shipmates, and fellow Marines gathered to remember this good man and his great deeds. LSCD Adams, NAFEC's chaplain began the ceremony with some anecdotes about Jack, such as how Warrant Officer Van Vooren's men would whisper "Mufasa, Mufasa" reverently as he walked by. Speaking next was the Commanding Officer of NAF El Centro, Captain Thompson. The Skipper looked over at Jack's brother, daughter, and uncle and described how our loss could never match theirs. He told his own stories about how this quiet man was so capable of solving problems. He never complained about how hard a task would be, he simply nodded his head and said "Ave Ave Sir."

Within days, or sometimes hours, Jack delivered. CDR Rosa from FISC San Diego spoke next and echoed the CO's sentiments. Jack was critical to the successful transition of the fueling operations from COMNAVREGSW N3 to FISC.

After the remarks, the audience stood as the National Anthem played and NAFEC's Color Guard, assisted by Marines from MCAS Yuma paraded the colors. The Marine Corps flag dipped as their



DEA moves to emergency control of Synthetic Marijuana



On November 24, 2010 the United States Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) opted to use its emergency scheduling authority to temporarily control five chemicals used to make "fake pot" products. This action will make possessing and selling these chemicals or the products that contain them illegal in the U.S. for at least one year while the DEA and the United States Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) further study whether these chemicals and products should be permanently controlled. The five chemicals will be designated as Schedule I substances, the most restrictive category, which is reserved for unsafe, highly abused substances with no medical usage.

Over the past year, smokable herbal blends marketed as being "legal" and providing a marijuana-like high, have become increasingly popular, particularly among teens and young adults. These products consist of plant material that has been coated with research chemicals that mimic THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, and are sold at a variety of retail outlets, s and over the Internet. These chemicals have not been approved by the FDA for human consumption and there is no oversight of the manufacturing process. Brands such as "Spice," "K2," "Blaze," and "Red X Dawn" are labeled as incense to mask their intended purpose.

The Comprehensive Crime Control Act of 1984 amends the Controlled Substances Act (CSA) to allow the DEA Administrator to emergency schedule an abused, harmful, non-medical substance in order to avoid an imminent public health crisis while the formal rule-making procedures described in the CSA are being conducted. DEA Acting Administrator Michele M. Leonhart stated that, "Makers of these harmful products mislead their customers into thinking that 'fake pot' is a harmless alternative to illegal drugs, but that is not the case. Today's action will call further attention to the risks of ingesting unknown compounds and will hopefully take away any incentive to try these products."


---- A Movie Review ----

Unstoppable: 1,000,000 Tons 100,000 Lives 100 Minutes

Players: Denzel Washington, Chris Pine

AWESOME, TREMENDOUS, FANTASTIC! Okay now I'll tell you how I really feel. I was pleasantly surprised by this film. Kudos go out to Tony Scott for his direction and vision. I mean, seriously, how much can someone expand on a runaway train plot? You would be surprised as it was not so much an out of control train storyline that allure but rather the people and sub-stories of the two main characters. Frank Barnes (Denzel Washington) is a grizzled veteran engineer being forced to retire, with half the benefits, by corporate management



as a cost cutting move. Frank is a true blue collar guy and professional doing his best to maintain a relationship with his two teenage daughters during the aftermath of their mother's death. Denzel does a marvelous job at giving this character life because, simply put, because he is Denzel. Will Colson (Chris Pine of Star Trek fame) is the rookie conductor assigned to pair up with Frank. The Colson name is what many believe expedited Will's progression to conductor status, with that being the case he would still have to prove his worth to Frank. Will is not without family troubles of his own as his wife hit him with a 30 day restraining order after he "directed" her friend to find another friend. The friend in question happened to be a law enforcement officer they both grew up with and Will's direction included a firearm.

Although some may find it hard to believe that a train filled with hazardous material is freelancing through Pennsylvania without a driver it may be even harder to believe that it does not derail and tragedy is avoided. This movie hits like a runaway train (pun intended) once it gets rolling. The recipe for disaster starts when an idiot assigned to simply move the train loses control once he breaks operating procedures. Once the train picks up speed evasive measures are coordinated and implemented with the exception of immediate derailment; a corporate decision. The entire corporate decision process reminded me of this summer's BP fiasco specifically the portrayal of the CEO's first notification of the problem. Okay, something else that may be a tad bit hard to believe for an audience but go with it because it makes for a good movie. As Frank and Will track down, get it, track down the UA train their kinship evolves as the vet advises the rook on career and life issues. All-the-while the renegade train barrels along accompanied by the media, police and a welder. This welder plays a pivotal part to the success of the mission but you will have to see this for yourself. As I sat on the edge of my seat I found myself rooting aloud (the wife did not really appreciate it) for Frank and Will to succeed at stopping this train, not only for the endangered community but to have the ability to stick it to their corporate management team. As luck would have it the media coverage reaches both Frank's daughters and Will's wife who is so moved by his heroism that she cannot restrain herself from greeting him on scene after all is said and done. Needless to say Frank is promoted prior to retiring with a full benefits package, Will reunites with his wife and the corporate manager along with the idiot responsible for the wild train are fired.

With that being said I rate this film with four and a half fouled anchors out of five. *



PERFORM TO SERVE (PTS)

Responsibility, we all have it to one degree or another. One very important thing we are responsible for doesn't have anything to do with fixing aircraft or a ship's weapons systems; it has to do with taking care of ourselves. What am I talking about? I'm talking about our careers! But we all need help navigating the twisting roads of our careers so we can succeed. A career topic that touches a lot of Sailor's lives is reenlisting. But one thing not universally understood is the approval method needed to reenlist. Perform to Serve (PTS) is the program the Navy uses for this approval. It is a force shaping tool designed to retain the Navy's best Sailors and meet current and future man power needs. But let's be realistic, it has become harder today to "stay Navy" then ever before. NAVADMIN 352/10 discusses the new changes to this process.



Fast facts concerning PTS:

- 1. All Sailors E3 to E6 and with less than 14 years have to be put into the PTS program regardless of reenlistment intentions.
- 2. There are three zones and each zone you enter needs a separate approval.
 - a. Zone A 0-6 years of service
 - b. Zone B 6-10 years of service
 - c. Zone C 10-14 years of service
- 3. A sailor must be entered into the system as early as 15 months prior to, but no later 12 months prior to their Soft End Active Obligated Service (SEAOS) or Projected Rotation Date (PRD). SEAOS is a Sailor's EAOS + any extensions.
- 4. Each Sailor gets six looks, once a month starting at their 12 month window.
- 5. If after six months a Sailor does not get approved to reenlist or convert, the CCC will receive a message saying the Sailor must begin his separation process and will be separated at his EAOS.
- 6. A PTS approval quota is only good for a period of 13 months or one reenlistment.
- 7. Extensions do not require PTS approval if they meet certain requirements listed in specific instructions.
- 8. PTS quotas that were obtained prior to the 13 month expression period or before October 2009 will expire soon and you need to seek your CCC to find out when.
- 9. Sailors can choose to remain affiliated with the active Navy or can elect to ask for a reserve billet but not both.

There are two other areas of importance when we talk about the selection process for PTS; what they compare and what will make you ineligible. When they compare individuals for those coveted reenlistment quota's, they look at an individual's pay grade, advancement status, last five evaluations, critical NEC's held, PFA performance, and proximity to SEAOS. The things that make you ineligible for PTS are:

- 1. Not being recommended for reenlistment on the most recent evaluation
- 2. Having significant problems or a progressing mark on a Sailor's two most recent evaluations

The Navy is changing every day to fit the demands the world puts on it. We need to remain fluid, knowledgeable, and be aware of these changes to make informed decisions to succeed in the Navy of the future. If you have any questions regarding this article seek out your Command Career Counselor.






BOOK REVIEW

The Evre Affair- Jasper Fforde

The *Eyre Affair* is a truly original book. Jasper Fforde manages to incorporate something for everyone in this remarkable novel. Set in 1985 Britain, this is a tale of science fiction, classic literature, and cloak and dagger mystery. In this age, time travel is a very real possibility and classic literature is taken VERY seriously. So seriously that one can be imprisoned for taking too many liberties with a production of Richard III or A Midsummer Night's Dream (imagine throwing Leonardo DiCaprio and Claire Danes in prison for their interpretation of Romeo and Juliet). The heroin of *Eyre Affair is Miss Thursday Next.* The novel follows her as she tracks down and attempts to stop one of 1985 Britain's most ruthless criminals. A man named Acheron Hades, whose minor crimes include murder, theft, and kidnapping. What's New in the World of CPR?



Both the American Heart Association (AHA) and American Red Cross (ARC) offer certification classes in First Aid, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and Automated External Defibrillator (AED). Both organizations are nationally recognized and accepted leaders in providing quality training programs at the local, state and national levels. However, the AHA offers a two year certification with all training programs. ARC only offers one (1) year certifications in CPR.

The AHA also does all the research and writes the Emergency Cardiac Care (ECC) guidelines for CPR, First Aid and AEDs. The American Red Cross uses the American Heart Association Guidelines to create their programs. So, if you wanted the best CPR program, wouldn't you want to work with the person who did all the research and wrote all the guidelines?

HM2 (FMF) Raquel Havig, Basic Life Support (BLS) Program Coordinator for Naval Medical Center San Diego has also confirmed, "You are correct we follow American Heart Association. Yes there has been some release of the NEW guidelines for performing CPR [ed. note: compressions only]. American Heart Association has yet to start practicing them. As of now we still practice the old guidelines when we instruct new BLS Providers. In December, American Heart Association will be conducting a conference where it will release all the new material and guidelines for performing BLS. 




Although at times it may seem that NAF El Centro (NAFEC) is more of a home to Marine Corps aviation units than Navy ones, at the beginning of our base's story it actually was a Marine Corps Air Station! That is right; NAFEC started its career as a Marine. The story begins in 1941 when the Civil Aeronautics Authority (CAA), a forerunner of the FAA, offered to construct a new airport for the Imperial Valley if Imperial County would provide the land. The CAA deemed the original airport (today's Imperial County Airport) as unsuitable for the new facility and the county purchased farmland near Seely for the project.



In 1942, the USMC tasked LCol William Fox with finding good locations for airfields in Imperial Valley. The primary site was obviously the modern airfield under construction. The Navy leased the airport while subsequently purchasing adjoining land in order to construct the necessary infrastructure. As the buildings went up, the CAA expanded the two runways and added a third. Finally, on 1 January 1943, MCAS El Centro was conceived with the commissioning of Marine Base Defense Air Group 43, VMF-216, and VMSB-235. MCAS El Centro was actually born on 24 July 1943. After nearly three years, the Marines decommissioned MCAS El Centro and on 1 May 1946 the Navy commissioned the property as NAS El Centro.





Before he became an astronaut or Senator, John Glenn flew here with VMO-155. Charles Lindbergh, the first man to fly across the Atlantic, ferried a new version of the Corsair to El Centro and provided some instruction in the new systems to the squadrons. Finally, the actor Tyrone Power flew with VMR-352.

Various aircraft called El Centro home. These include: the SBD Dauntless, PV 1 Ventura, F4F Wildcats, F4U Corsair, PBJ Mitchell, F6F-3N Hellcat, R4D Dakota, and R5C Skymaster.❖

Wills: What's the Big deal?

Will's are documents which outline how you want your assets and property to be distributed upon your death. All adults who have any significant amount of property (cars, jewelry, savings, real estate, etc) should have a will. If you are married, both you and your spouse must have separate wills. Communal property, such as joint bank accounts and joint real estate, are automatically transferred to the surviving member upon one member's death. Additionally, wills should be changed after every marriage, divorce, birth, or death. Your will should be updated after any significant event that may affect how you choose to dispose of your assets. Wills do not include health care directives. Many service-members confuse wills with living wills. A living will expressly outlines your wishes to be taken off life-support if you are declared brain dead. A springing power of attorney appoints someone who will make financial decisions for you IF you become incapacitated. I highly recommend in addition to a will, that all service members obtain a living will and springing power of attorney. These are essential steps to ensuring that your family is prepared. hymn was played. Then the congregation joined voices to sing three verses from Eternal Father. Once the crowd took their seats, Chaplain Adams began his service. Jack was young when he left us. Many had a hard time even believing he was gone, but LCDR Adams reminded us that in the Bible, the book of Ecclesiastes says that "There is a time for everything and a season for every activity under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die...a time for war and a time for peace." Chaps related these verses to Jack's life, and the impact Jack had on each of us. He helped us to see that this was the right time for Jack.

Next, ABFC(ret) Marc Willis took the podium and began to describe Jack as only a best friend can. He told us how Jack was instrumental in giving him the opportunities to finish his degree, and supported Willis as he tried out his new roles in Operations. He related stories about how Jack would come over to visit him and chat about sports, or sometimes, just step in to stir the pot between the OPSO and the Chiefs and then quietly leave with an ear-to-ear grin. But most of all, he tried to impress upon the gathering how Jack was dedicated to the job and his comrades, often proactive in his approach to work, solving problems before the rest of us knew they were there. He went on to mention the time Jack won recognition as Civilian of the Quarter. Jack never wanted to stand out in the crowd. He enjoyed working behind the scenes to ensure the success of the mission. Nevertheless, he took it all in stride, even having his name up on the base marquee, much to his chagrin. As Chief Willis sat down, the Chaplain introduced Jack's brother, Leon, and invited him up. In quiet hushed tones, Leon mentioned that his family's greatest fear upon arriving in El Centro was that Jack lived alone and died alone. He and his family were grateful to learn that Jack was not alone. He had a large, loving, extended family. They were in awe by the support afforded them throughout the base and extending into the community. Burgers and Beer, Jack's favorite hangout, became theirs too.

With the eulogies and service completed, two sharply dressed Marines from MCAS Yuma stood up and approached the altar, where a flag lay and a picture of Jack stood. In unison, they picked up our Nation's colors and expertly folded the cherished banner. Then, in perfect step they marched to the rear of the chapel and stood by as the NAFEC Honor Guard delivered a 21 gun salute. After carefully placing a shell casing into the folds of the flag, the Marines marched back and presented the flag of the United States of America to Jack's brother. The Marines carefully rendered their salute and promptly returned to their seats. All hands stood as Chaplain Adams gave the invocation and the memorial concluded. Thereafter, many people lined up to pay their respects to Jack's family. As the crowd dispersed, one could only wonder if Jack was looking down on us all with his smile and a twinkle in his eye. 

Making the old new!

To help beautify the base and recognize some of the different aircraft which have flown here over the years, the Chief's Mess, along with some dedicated Sailors are restoring an F-14 Tomcat. Once completed, this legendary fighter will go on display in front of the Mirage Club. Restoration is a lengthy process that starts with sanding the entire aircraft exterior to prepare it for a fresh coat of paint. After sanding the plane, prep work for the actual painting begins. This entails taping off all the markings on the plan and cleaning the aircraft to make sure no dust, debris, or oils are on the skin. The base coat of grey is then applied to about 90% of the aircraft. After the grey coat is dry we then prep and apply the different gloss paints for the many markings that cover the aircraft. While the process seems simple, it is the actual size of the plane that makes it time consuming. From a distance planes may seem small. But when you walk right up to them, there is a large amount of metal that needs some good old TLC. The final product will be a plane that the entire base will be proud of. This particular F-14 will be painted in the squadron colors of VF-114, the Aardvarks. The inspiration for using this squadron came when a tombstone commemorating the life of the squadron was discovered in a back lot of the base. The aircraft and tombstone will be located in the open field next to the Mirage Club (just in case you were wondering why there is an empty slab sitting there!) Many thanks go to NC1 Jones, AM2 Westenbarger and MA2 Hodges for helping the Chief's "git er done!"

Most of the time you can find personnel from Navy Munitions Command El Centro volunteering during the week, mainly on Fridays, when the workload permits, of course. Sometimes they take as few as 3 people and some days as many as 7 people will show up to lend a hand.

One of them is AO1 Dennis Abela, not only does this Sailor carry a full workload as the Quality Assurance Leading Petty Officer, but he is also the liaison between the Food Bank and the Navy. He said that he likes to help when the helps needed most and it is his job to know when they need help. When I asked AO1 how he feels about volunteering he stated "Doing this kind of work, not only helps people in the local community, but also gives me the satisfaction that a little bit of time can go a long way, to me its kind of like doing God's work" AO1 hopes that this will open everyone's eyes to helping in anyway possible.

Another volunteer was AO2 Ryan Heeney, it was his first time volunteering but he enjoyed every moment. He said this about volunteering "It's good and makes everyone pull together for a good cause and helping people is always nice". This day we had more help than usual and I would like to give special recognition to AZ2 Williams, AO2 Pins and AO2 Collier.

As we all know the holidays are quickly approaching and the Food Bank seeks to get more and more volunteers for the increased spike in work they experience around the holidays. The job today was to help collect turkeys through the Turkey Drive which was taking place in front of Wal-Mart. It was very exciting to see that before we even opened one kind Gentleman had donated close to 50 turkeys already; their original quota was to collect 400. We also had the task of asking for monetary donations at the entrance and the people were very kind on this Friday. Maybe it was due to it being a Friday and a payday or just seeing the hard work on the volunteers but the Imperial Valley Community was very kind. After everything was said and done the Imperial Valley Food Bank had collected 535 turkeys and collected over \$1,100.00 in donations.

I spoke with Ted Turner the warehouse manager of the Imperial Food Bank and he said "It's great to have these guys from the Navy out here, it just shows us how much they care about the local community and how everyone can lend a helping hand no matter what you do or who you are. "On a daily basis the food bank has between 5 to 10 volunteers and serves as many as 12,000 volunteers a month of food daily to Imperial County residents in need, they are always looking for a helping hand. In 2009, volunteers provided the equivalent of two full-time employees. Another interesting fact was in 2009, IVFB distributed an incredible 750,000 lbs of nutritious fresh produce - three times as much as the previous year. With the economy on shaky grounds in the past few years the Food bank has seen a tremendous spike in people requiring assistance from Imperial Valley residents, and they have stepped up their effort.

I also spoke with Gunner Covington the Officer In Charge at NMC El Centro to ask his point of view on his guys hard work at the Food Bank. Although it is very busy at work and his plate is always full with work he supports his people and loves helping the community he told me "I fully support it, when you have guys who take their own time to go out and do some volunteer work, I will always support that, we want to support the local community as much as they support us". This to me sounds like a boss who fully supports the community involvement his team gives.

In the end, it is hard to realize how much a few hours of your time can make a lasting impression. Sometimes we forget, that maybe we may not need help now, but we may have friends or family whom do. My hope is that there will be someone as nice as these guys to help out when they need it the most. Once again I say go out and lend a helping hand to someone in need, you never know how much it means. Till next time friends take care and lend a hand


