MCPON Visits the Pearl of the Desert

MCPON West, the twelfth Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy, visited NAFEC on 9 November 2011. He is the first MCPON to visit the base in its recorded history. West met with Command leadership for a few minutes before addressing 200 Saliors and civilians during an all hands call.

West opened up the hour long session with a personal anecdote about communication. He then spent the majority of the time answering the questions from the crowd. From the tone of the questions, we are most interested in hear how the Navy currently supports Sailors and their families, the reasons for and impact of the Enlisted Retention Board, Perform to Serve, the Physical Fitness Assessment and local BAH disparity.

Sailors also offered up suggestions on how the Navy might improve the PFA through an incentive program. This brought a big smile to the MCPON's face as he mentioned some of the details of a similar programmed that he had just offered up to the Chief of Naval Operations.

He mentioned that he was asked by MCPON 6, William Plackett recently what his two biggest problems were, and West quickly answered "people and money." These same issues were of concern to Plackett as well and "...will probably still be a concern for the MCPON100 years from now."

West also elaborated on how personnel management and tight budgets are the biggest issues facing our sister services as well.

MCPON finished up the hour with another anecdote about surviving "those bad days at work." Needless to say, the phrase "shiny apples" has become the new buzzword on base and already seen on many of our Sailor's Facebook posts.

LS3 Sarah Candito and MASN Jordan Reckmann fired up the crowd for a huge final MCPON HOORAH.

Afterwards, West visited the CYP, did a windshield tour of the base and met with the Chiefs for a working lunch.

Across the board, everyone on base was impressed with the message the MCPON had and a better understanding of the issues facing all of us today. ��

Transition Benefits: Veterans Job Bank Links Employers Directly To Separating Sailors (NAVY NEWS SERVICE 15 NOV 11) ... Navy Personnel Command Public Affairs

MILLINGTON, Tenn. -- Sailors transitioning from the Navy seeking to begin a second career can access an online job bank geared to connect veterans with employers who desire the skills veterans bring to the work force.

The Veterans Job Bank provides a central resource that allows veterans to access jobs available specifically for them, according to the site.

The job bank is available at https://www.nationalresourcedirectory.gov/jobSearch and is part of the National Resource Directory website. The website enables veterans to search a variety of job boards, corporate employment sites, and social media platforms with one click. Sailors and veterans can search for jobs based on location and keyword, or by rating or officer designator to find jobs more closely aligned with their skills and abilities. The site also provides a way for employers to target veterans by enabling employers to "tag" job postings for specifically for former service members.

Currently, the Veterans Job Bank contains more than 500,000 open job listings, a number that is expected to continue to grow as more employers and companies tag job postings on their own websites and add them to the job bank.

The Defense, Labor and Veterans Affairs departments created the National Resource Directory located at http://www.nationalresourcedirectory.gov/ to link wounded warriors, service members, veterans, their families and caregivers to nationwide resources that support recovery, rehabilitation and community reintegration.

The directory also contains information on a broad range of topics, including benefits and compensation, education and training, employment, caregiver support, health, housing, and transportation and travel.

ELECTRONIC SERVICE RECORDS

IS MY RECORD UP TO DATE?

MILLINGTON, Tenn. With the announcement of the Fiscal Year 2013 E-7 selection board cycle Nov. 17, leadership reminds Sailors it is their responsibility to ensure their Official Military Personal File (OMPF) is up to date.

"It's up to the Sailor to make sure that their service records are correct and not missing anything," said Jim Giger, head of Records Management Policy Branch (PERS-313), Navy Personnel Command (NPC). "If a Sailor finds something is wrong, they should take steps to correct it as soon as possible."

Sailors should not confuse their OMPF with the Electronic Service Record (ESR). They are two separate records with differing functions.

The ESR is an online version of the old field service record maintained at the command level. Information entered into the ESR is used to update corporate data, create documents for the OMPF, and provide up-to-date human resource information to a Sailor's local command when the OMPF is not available. It's not a permanent record like the OMPF. Also, when a Sailor is transferred or separated, temporary information is purged from their ESR.

Sailors can review and update their personal emergency contact information and other service record items in their ESR self-service account through the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System (NSIPS) website at https://nsips.nmci.navy.mil. Sailors afloat can access their ESR self-service account through the ship's NSIPS server.

If information is considered permanent, the personnel office or personnel support detachment (PSD) will verify, print, sign and send required documents to the OMPF to be retained permanently, said Giger.

The OMPF is the record reviewed by selection boards and is also used to manage a service member's assignments, training, advancement and separation.

Why Advancement Matters...

It's that time of year again and advancement results are on the street. Congratulations to all personnel that were selected for advancement. Hopefully, we all strive to get that coveted promotion. Each Sailor has their own reasons for advancement such as the bigger paychecks, the increase in responsibility, or the personal pride of achieving a goal. But what about those reasons that are intangible and not widely known?

For those that want to make the Navy a career or simply re- enlist one more time, advancement is a requirement. We have all heard of the program, Perform to Serve (PTS). PTS gives you the necessary permission to reenlist or extend your contract. One thing a lot of people don't know is that <u>rank</u> is the first thing they look at when they stack you against your peers for that PTS quota. A First Class will get the PTS quota before a Second Class. If you are an individual that wants to stay Navy then advancement is a big part of your ability to make that happen. If you haven't made the decision to remain on active duty then strive to make your next rank anyway. It will increase your chances at a PTS quota, thereby giving you the option to stay.

Another benefit of getting promoted is that it increases your chances of being able to retire, and the higher the paygrade, the larger the retainer checks. What am I talking about? High year tenure (HYT) sets certain enlistment milestones you cannot pass without advancing to the next rank. You can retire as a First Class Petty Officer at 20 years. Continuing to promote extends the length of time you can stay in, up to 30 years. At 30 years in the Navy, you would retire with 75% of your base pay for the rest of your life. A large portion of the fleet joined at 18 and would then retire at 48 with a huge retirement.

Making rank does not just affect your pay and responsibility; it affects the length of your career. If making the decision to continue your naval service is even an option on the table, then it is in your best interests to try and advance to the highest rank you can. This means studying and being the best Sailor you can be! •

I read an article in a recent edition of the San Diego Union-Tribune where a young woman wrote in asking a car repair expert about her leaky brakes on her 2003 Kia Rio. She wanted to know whether she could use duct tape as a temporary fix. The expert's reply was direct—absolutely not!

Per NAVADMIN 349/11, the Fiscal Year 2013 E-7 selection board will review the OMPF of all candidates. If documents are missing from a candidate's OMPF, they must submit those documents, along with a cover letter to the selection board president, to be reviewed by the board.

Letters sent to a selection board for consideration will not be added to a service member's OMPF permanently. BUPERSINST 1070.27 outlines all items that should or should not be submitted by officer and enlisted personnel and how to submit those documents.

"The longer a Sailor waits to correct something in their record or add something that is missing, the harder it is for NPC or the Sailor to validate there is an error," said Giger. "If the error is not obvious, the Sailor has to show the personnel office the mistake and provide supporting documentation. If a Sailor waits too long, getting a copy of something like an old evaluation from a reporting senior could be very difficult."

To securely review and print OMPF documents, Sailors can use OMPF-My Record on BUPERS Online (BOL) at https://www.bol.navy.mil. The application allows them to view, download and print documents such as Page 13s, performance evaluations, award citations, orders and other service record items. Downloading or saving documents to shared workstations is not recommended though, because OMPF documents contain personally identifiable information that could be compromised in a shared environment.

"We talk to service members every day that don't know what's in their record," said Giger. "Make it a routine to periodically review your record. Every six months, go online and look at your ESR and OMPF, make sure your evaluations are there and see if anything new has been added. When you look at your OMPF and see that a document was electronically submitted from PSD, go into the record to see if it was accepted, because sometimes documents get rejected and you need to make sure they are resubmitted."

After separation, OMPF documents are used primarily to protect the legal and financial rights of the government, veterans, their families and survivors, according to Giger.

"At least a quarter of the requests for records that we get here are from the Department of Labor and the Department of Veterans Affairs looking to see if a prior service member is eligible for some kind of a benefit," said Giger. "If we don't have documents on file in a service member's record, we can't provide them the information they're looking for."

"Sailors also need to keep a hard-copy of everything that affects their career while in the Navy so if they notice an error in their OMPF, they can go to the personnel office or PSD directly and get it fixed," said Giger. "No electronic system is fool-proof and even though we have the ability to recover most corrupt files or images, sometimes we cannot, and obtaining a copy from the Sailor is the only way we can retrieve a copy of a lost image."

If Sailors order a copy of their OMPF on a compact disc (CD) through BOL once new documents are added or their record is updated, the CD becomes outdated. Giger recommends Sailors access their records online via BOL for the most up-to-date service record information, said Giger. ❖

☑PSC(SW/AW)Arana recommends sailors ordering a compact disk (CD) a couple of weeks before going Fleet Reserve and or separating, at least this way you will have majority of your official record readily available and will not have to resort to contacting Millington after being separated or retired. As we all know it's easier to obtain such information while on active duty. Remember, it takes anywhere between 60-90 days to update your OMPF once documents have been submitted. If you don't see them even though they have been submitted don't assume the board can.

ANOTHER FIRST FOR NAFEC - OPS GETS NAVY'S NEWEST TACAN

Good things come to those who wait. And sometimes being in the middle of nowhere is a good place to be. This was the case for NAF El Centro and Operations Department specifically when it came to installing the Navy's newest navigational beacon the AN/URN-32 TACAN. TACAN stands for Tactical Air Navigation. It is essentially a radio beacon to help pilots find their way as they fly. Think of it as an electronic signpost. Both military and commercial pilots use these beacons as they fly across country. When a ship is out to sea, it's the TACAN that helps aircraft find their way back to the vessel.

NAFEC was selected as the first shore installation for this new technology. It replaces the AN/URN-25 TACAN which was first delivered back in the 1960's. While much of the systems are the same, miniaturization and new technology makes this a more stable, more





compact and more energy efficient. SPAWAR sent out specifications to several vendors and the winning design has several advantages. First, the replacement parts are plug-and-play. There was no need for new cabinets or cabling. Second, the control interfaces are all touch screen. There are no more clunky dials and switches. This reduced the total install time, including testing, down to just four days.

Several Navy entities will be watching our system carefully as the months go by. Soon, this upgrade will be at every shore facility and there are plans to put it on ships as well. Training curriculum is already in development and the school houses are gearing up to teach the new "guts." Oh, and unless you know where the TACAN shack is...you won't see this shiny new toy. It will be behind closed doors keeping the pilots well informed of where they are. *

Celebrate the Holidays by Saving Energy

The holiday season is upon us. Decorative lights and fixtures will certainly be a part of our celebration as we ready our homes, offices and other base areas for the holidays. The Naval Air Facility El Centro's holiday lighting tips strive to achieve a balance of individual desires for decorative lighting with our responsibility to conserve energy and be good stewards of our resources. Please observe the following tips:

<u>Workplace Decorations</u> – Holiday lights may be lit in the interior of workspaces during normal working hours only. Use of non-electrical decorations like garlands, tinsel, ribbons, and wreaths is highly encouraged.

<u>Decorative Lighting</u> – Low wattage, miniature lamp strings are encouraged for all decorative lighting. New Light Emitting Diode (LED) string lights use only a small fraction of the energy required by popular mini-lights, burn cooler and last longer.

The Base Energy Manager offers these additional tips to make your holidays a little more energy efficient.

- If you are purchasing an artificial Christmas tree you would do well to consider a fiber optic model.
- Put your holiday lights on a timer to reduce costs, remove the daily burden of turning them on and off yourself, and prevent leaving them on all night or during daylight hours. Check those outdoor lights at your workplace to be sure they are turned off during the day.
- Though halogen torchiere lamps can get hot enough to roast chestnuts, they are a potential fire hazard and proven energy guzzler. Give yourself an early holiday present this year by trading in your halogen torchiere for a compact fluorescent lamp (CFL) torchiere for a brighter, thriftier, and safer holiday season.

If you're looking for that last stocking stuffer or a major gift, think about energy efficient products. For major gifs, such as computers, televisions, and appliances, look for the Energy Star label, the symbol for energy efficiency. When shopping for the kids, remember there's nothing wrong with gifts that are powered by the mind and imagination rather than batteries or electricity.

Unplug the video games and turn off the millionth broadcast of "It's A Wonderful Life" or sitcom – read your favorite holiday story instead. Your children may appreciate your time and attention, and you will be saving energy in the process.

Make a New Year's Resolution that can actually keep itself! Save 70% in electrical consumption by replacing your incandescent light bulbs with compact fluorescent lights. Do something simple like turn off an unused light and power down computers and printers when not in use. ❖







How to Protect Yourself While You are Deployed or When you PCS.

Civil court proceedings and getting out of leases can be difficult for active duty service members who regularly deploy and PCS to duty stations in other states and OCONUS. There is legislation passed by Congress designed to protect you from default judgments, capping interest on loans, and termination of leases to name a few. The legislation is known as the Service Members Civil Relief Act, 50 United States Code Appendix Sections 501-593 (SCRA).

If you have a specific question about your individual situation please seek advice from a legal assistance attorney at the Navy Legal Service Office (NLSO). Legal assistance attorneys can be reached at 619-556-1663. This article will touch of three of the most utilized area of the SCRA.

EARLY TERMINATION OF LEASES; First and foremost, sailors have to transfer duty stations regularly, state to state and sometimes overseas. Landlords do not always follow the rules laid out in the SCRA. Remember, the SCRA is national legislation that applies to all landlords in the US. In accordance with the law, landlords must release sailors that have valid PCS or separation orders from their leases without charging penalties for early termination of the lease. The requirement on you the service member is to notify your landlord in writing at least 30 days before you need to terminate the lease. To notify your landlord in writing, ensure that you keep a copy of the letter, include a copy of your orders in the letter, and either hand deliver or send the letter via registered mail. Remember too, that separation orders are PCS orders per the SCRA. Some landlords have tried to corral sailors into paying early termination fees because they incorrectly believed separation orders were not covered. Do not let a landlord intimidate you. Seek advice from a legal assistance attorney if you're having an SCRA issue or any other trouble with your landlord. This portion of the Act also provides for the termination of an automobile lease on the occasion of the member receiving PCS orders to an overseas duty location.

<u>6% CAP ON INTEREST RATES</u>, Under the SCRA, a service member can secure a maximum of 6% per annum rate of interest on all loans incurred prior to coming onto active duty if military service affects the member's ability to meet the obligation. This can include interest rates on credit cards, mortgages, and even some student loans (federally guaranteed student loans are specifically exempted), to name a few. Typically, this protection will also extend to joint and several obligations incurred by the service member and his or her spouse. For more information and for the specifics of application please contact a legal assistance attorney at the NLSO.

PROTECTION FROM EVICTION, A service member leasing a house or apartment, whose rental payment is below a specified amount, may be protected under the SCRA from being evicted for a period of 90 days. The dwelling place must be occupied by either the active duty member or his dependents, and the rent on the premises cannot exceed the annually adjusted ceiling. This ceiling, which began in 2003 as \$2400.00 per month, is adjusted annually in accordance with changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). The member must also show that the period of active military service has materially affected his ability to pay rent. If a landlord continues to try to evict the military member or does actually evict the member, he or she can be subject to criminal sanctions such as fines or even imprisonment. •

Navy Munitions Command Det

For the last issue of the year I wanted to highlight our proud history as Ordies. I researched a couple of websites, read A LOT and learned things about my rate that I didn't even know.

The history of Aviation Ordnance is a long & rich one. The Navy's Aviation Ordnance rating began on April 9, 1915 when a Chief Gunners Mate and a Chief Turret Captain, along with several other mechanics, were sent to Pensacola, Florida to work on what would be the beginning of aircraft armament and ordnance systems.



The Navy accepted its first aircraft on August 9, 1911. Early bombing tests were held in January and February of 1913. In March of 1918, the Aviation Ordnance (AVORD) sub-section in the Bureau of Ordnance, became a separate unit. Previously it served as a division of the Surface Gun Mount section. As a separate group, they were given cognizance over the procurement and technical aspects of machine guns, including mounts, sights, fittings and ammunition. Other aviation ordnance items falling within AVORD cognizance in 1918 were larger caliber guns, bombs, bomb racks, bomb sights, pyrotechnic signaling devices, air launched torpedoes, aircraft torpedo launching equipment, and training devices which include miniature practice bombs.

The rate that would eventually become Aviation Ordnance was Gunner's Mate Aviation & it was established in 1918. An act of Congress changed this rating to Gunner's Mate assigned to aviation in 1920. Gunner's Mates who had qualified as aviation armament and munitions technicians, and were attached to an aviation activity, were so identified by appropriate entries in their service records. These Gunner's Mates functioned as the aviation ordnancemen until mid 1926.

The Aviation Ordnanceman rating was established at all four petty officer grades of Chief, First, Second and Third Class on March 2, 1926 as a rating within the Aviation Branch. The Aviation Ordnanceman rating was filled initially from qualified personnel serving primarily with the ratings of Gunner's Mate and Torpedoman (assigned to aviation). The Aviation Ordnanceman specialty mark, a winged flaming spherical shell, was incorporated into Uniform Regulations in January 1927. From then on, the rating went through several sub divisions (like AOU, AOT, and AOF). In 1948, it officially became the rate we all know & love, AO.

Our Marine brothers & sisters share a close history with us as well. And, though it is unclear as to how our motto began exactly, as always IYAOYAS. ❖

Transition Benefits: Navy Officials Release New Transition Assistance Handbook

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) -- A new transition assistance handbook was published on the Navy Personnel Command (NPC) command website Nov. 4, to provide Sailors a centralized listing of transition services and benefits available to Sailors leaving the Navy.

The transition assistance handbook, announced in NAVADMIN 332/11, outlines existing and new benefits available to all Sailors as part of the Navy's comprehensive transition support strategy.

Sailors can view/download the handbook online in a portable document format (.pdf) on the Navy Personnel Command (NPC) ERB Web Page at www.npc.navy.mil/boards/ERB/.

The new handbook acts as a resource guide for Sailors not only affected by the ERB, but also those retiring or transitioning to the Selected Reserve (SELRES) or National Guard.

It includes a list of benefits and services available for eligible transitioning service members, useful websites, and information on counseling services, the transition assistance program (TAP) and the transition assistance management program (TAMP).

Key transition benefits for all transitioning Sailors can be found in the new handbook and include:

- * Education benefits
- * Involuntary separation benefits
- * Government opportunities
- * Relocation assistance information
- * Department of Labor and Veteran's Affairs (VA) employment assistance
- * VA health care and life insurance benefits
- * Affiliation with the SELRES for those meeting requirements

The handbook also contains a section for Sailors separating as a result of the Enlisted Retention Board. .

What's Up, Navy Doc?

"Overeating: Don't Let the Holidays Weight You
Down"

With the holidays upon us, we find ourselves in this wonderful season of peace and joy. We also find ourselves at many traditional family gatherings, which usually involves being tempted with lots of opportunities to eat and overeat. Of course, we all have to eat to survive; there is nothing wrong with that. Rather, it's when we overeat that we run into problems. On average, people gain anywhere from 5-10 pounds over the holiday season. Don't let this statistic include you. Below are some helpful hints to guide you around and through the maze of temptingly delicious food and drink during this holiday season and hopefully prevent your overeating:

- Eat *before* the Party. Many finger foods are high in calories and fat. It is very easy to overeat on these delicious snacks. Often times, you do not realize just how much you end up eating when you are "grazing" on these kinds of foods. However, if you eat *before* you get to the party, you are less likely to overindulge.
- Pass on the Alcohol. Did you know that just one glass of eggnog contains about 400 calories? Most alcohol is nothing more than empty calories, having no nutritional value, and these calories can add up quite quickly. After you have had your one glass of wine, try sticking to drinks like sparkling cider, which has much fewer calories. Or better yet, stick to water, which has zero calories. That way, you can make room for the calories in that one piece of your favorite pie.
- Bring a "safety dish". When you are going to someone's house for a party or a meal, you never know exactly what they will have to eat. Bring along a tray with a variety of vegetables with a hummus dip. Did you know that a cup of veggies and a quarter cup of hummus has only 125 calories, about half of the calories contained in just one chicken finger?
- Choose the "right" foods. Although they are certainly delicious and tempting, foods such as stuffing, gravy, ham and sausage are all rich in fat and calories. Stick to a variety of vegetables, like cranberries, corn and your favorite green vegetables. This tip also applies to choosing desserts. Did you know that eating just one piece of pecan pie with whipped cream can add as much as 700 calories to your body? A healthy alternative is having a piece of pumpkin pie without the whipped cream topping or ice cream.
- Eat slowly. Several medical studies have shown that it takes anywhere from 10-15 minutes or more for the signals from the stomach to get the brain, telling it that you are full and satisfied. By eating slowly, you allow these signals to more timely get to the brain and prevent yourself from overeating and feeling too full.
- Proportions, proportions, proportions. It's all about the proportions. Sample a little bit of everything. There is no need to starve yourself. Just be aware of how much you are eating. At a buffet, did you know that if you use the smallest plate possible, you can actually help trick your brain into believing that you are eating more than you really are? Go ahead and have that sliver piece of pie—just avoid eating a large piece or a second piece.

Moment to Remember: Don't let the centerpiece of the buffet table become the centerpiece of your holidays. Instead, enjoy this wonderful season of the year by spending time with your family and friends, enjoying their warm company while you socialize, talk about old times and create new memories. Think ... by choosing to leave the overeating and overindulging of food and drink to others who choose not to think. You can have a ton of fun without eating a ton of food. Come the New Year, your waistline will thank you for it! ❖

Restaurant Review

Recently I was craving some sushi, but didn't have much gas to get to San Diego where the seafood is plentiful. But I just had to satisfy that nagging feeling, so I decided to go to Kotori in El Centro on State Street. Let's just say that hunger did not get what hunger wanted!

I was seated promptly at a small and precariously wobbly table, where I proceeded to wait about ten to fifteen minutes before anybody came to take my drink order or anything. I thought I had been forgotten. Granted, this was at the lunch rush, but Kotori is a small restaurant so I knew I couldn't have been that easily overlooked, and there were plenty of servers working. I was starving at this point, and to make matters worse the single TV in the place was playing "Everyday Italian" on the Food Network. I thought, "Oh dear lord, Giada's cooking gnocci...I may end up gnawing off my own arm!"

Finally a waitress came to me and I ordered my obligatory iced tea, and since I had already had plenty of time to thoroughly peruse the menu I decided to order a Tiger Roll which consists of shrimp, avocado and cucumber on the inside with tuna, avocado, spicy mayo, eel sauce, and crunchy tempura flakes on the outside. It was ten dollars and I ordered it because it was a large roll for the money and had a decent amount of fish. I also ordered a cup of miso soup to tide me over until my roll came. The miso was of course awesome, warm and comforting, but that's not saying much because you'd have to have been lobotomized to mess up miso soup.

As I waited for my sushi I noticed that people who had been sat long after me were getting their food significantly sooner than I was, which was dissatisfying. And I was brought out the weirdest condiment tray I had ever seen consisting of some strange hot sauces, jalapenos, and some pickled carrots which I assumed were spicy also. As someone who worked in an authentic Japanese restaurant before the Navy and served a lot of sushi, I was grossed out, plus I HATE jalapenos or any spicy peppers for that matter. Big rolls are alright in certain instances, but when the rice lacks that signature sushi rice taste that it gets from being cooked with rice wine vinegar the way it should be, you're just left feeling jipped. The only thing that wasn't skimped on was the amount of sauces. The thing was swimming in spicy mayo and eel sauce, and I was an embarrassing hot mess trying to eat it. The eel sauce wasn't even the normal sweet and salty concoction which happens to be one of my favorite sushi ingredients, but more like a barbecue sauce, which was really saddening for me.



Screenwriter Dustin Black entrusts director Clint Eastwood and megastar Leonardo DiCaprio to give his words life.

J. Edgar is a biography that covers most the namesake's life but the primary plot focuses on his career in justice from beginning to end. The alternative plot in this movie brings to light the relationships he shares with his mother, Anna Marie Hoover (Judi Dench) partner Clyde Tolson (Armie Hammer) and personal secretary Helen Gandy (Naomi Watts). A dedicated American, at least in his eyes; he is portrayed throughout the film as having the nation's best interest at heart while participating in and/or authorizing questionable tactics.

Separating the film from fact is a must for this review as a lot of its content revolves around speculation. DiCaprio's depiction as Hoover is stimulating though not quite on the level of his role as Howard Hughes. Throughout, he is able to deliver plausible portrayals of both old and young Hoover. All the while, Hammer and Watts are equally believable in their representations as dedicated and loyal servants/associates of J. Edgar Hoover and the Federal Bureau of Investigations. With that being said, I rate this film three anchors out of five.

The wife and I had little to choose from this month and with it coming to a close quick we or rather I chose to view *Immortals*. Now, I must admit that I sort of wanted to see this film in belief that it would turn out to be just as good as *300*. The wife, however, just wanted popcorn. Brothers Charley and Vlas Parlapanides script a tale of Theseus versus King Hyperion that director Tarsem Singh converts to film.

Immortals is a story about King Hyperion (Mickey Rourke) and his endless search for the Epirus Bow, a mythical weapon that has the power to release the Titans. Theseus (Henry Cavill) is a young warrior hand-picked and secretly tutored by Zeus (Luke Evans) to defend his people against Hyperion's mob. As simple as that storyline was I believe that more could have been done to present a more attractive tale; there just seemed to be a lack of creativity. Undoubtedly a steadfast focus was given to the blood and guts interspersed throughout which works for some but not all.

For those of you interested only in the blood and guts you will not be disappointed as there was plenty of *gore* to go around. The fighting sequences are just as rousing as *300* but with added *Matrix* like effects such as slow motion and acrobatics. These additions bring the intensity up a notch and make the scenes noteworthy. Beyond the noteworthy clashes *Immortals* is deficient and lacks substance. With that being said, I rate this film two anchors out of five. •

They found one that is very appropriate to this month seeing as we just frocked several new Third Class Petty Officers. Who is this person and what was his greatest achievement? It is RADM Herbert Spencer Matthews, Jr. and he considered his promotion to AMM3c or Aviation Mechanics Mate Third Class as it was known in World War II to be the greatest one of his career. Some of his other accomplishments include:

He was the first Naval Aviation Pilot (NAP) to be promoted to flag rank in the Navy.

He won a state high school typing contest with a lightning fast 120 wpm on a manual typewriter!

At Enlisted Flight Training school conducted at the University of Georgia he graduated first in his class of 540 other students and was promoted to Naval Aviation Pilot First Class (AP1c) on August 15, 1942. Two weeks later he was promoted to Ensign. WOW!



During his operational training he received a Navy Commendation for being the first student to complete the celestial navigation course with the perfect grade of 4.0.

In 1951-2, he attended the Naval Postgraduate School, General Line Course where he graduated first in his class of 505 naval officers. In 1955 and 1956 he was "Top Gun" at the Fleet Air Gunnery Unit (FAGU), El Centro, CA. His squadron VA-76, was in Air Group ONE on the first deployment of the Navy's first "Supercarrier", USS Forrestal (CVA-59).

During his 33 years of service the Admiral, while enlisted, was a plane captain on 10 different aircraft. As a pilot he flew 17 different aircraft.

Not bad for a man who started out as a Yeoman striker...

You know how those Old Goats keep telling you to keep your eyes and ears out for history in the making? Well another notable personality to recently pass through El Centro, besides MCPON West was Captain Wales of the British Army. He came here as part of Exercise Crimson Eagle 11B, training in the AH-64D Apache helicopter. ❖

Building a Computer: A Multipart Series By AO2 Ryan Heeney

Step Three: The Build

WARNING: This is merely an informative article, it is not all-inclusive and should only be used as a reference when online guides are not available (they have pictures).

Now that all of the parts you ordered have been received, its time to get down to business. First thing first you need to make sure you save all your receipts, it is not uncommon to receive a part that is faulty from the manufacturer (or you ordered the wrong part or you broke it or...). Note that a lot of online computer stores will not keep a receipt for you more than a couple days; be sure to save an online copy when you get a chance. Return procedures are usually fairly simple, unfortunately in most cases you have to pay shipping in order to return it and some cases a restocking fee.

One thing you need to do before you handle any electronic components is to make sure you're grounded. Many components are extremely sensitive to electrostatic shock. This can be simply accomplished by purchasing a grounding strap and connecting it to something such as the center screw of an outlet or an exposed pipe. It's recommended to have a grounding strap but if you don't have one you can always touch both hands to a metal part on your case and try not to move around a lot, especially if you're on carpet (buy a grounding strap).

It's not absolutely necessary but you should install your CPU, heat sink and RAM before you install the motherboard. You will have more room to work with, but make sure you do not place the motherboard on something conductive; the box or anti-static bag it came in works great.

When installing the CPU make sure it is aligned correctly, do not force it, it should slide right into place. Try not to touch anything but the sides as the oils on your skin can cause heating issues, If you do touch the heat spreader(flat part on top) don't sweat it, all you need is 99% rubbing alcohol, wipe it down with a lint free cloth then spray off the leftover water with air in a can. After it is in place, use the lever to secure it, connect the power cord to the motherboard (labeled CPU fan) and have your heat sink ready.

In most cases when buying a processor it will come with a heat sink, depending on the manufacturer it will come with thermal film or a

In most cases when buying a processor it will come with a heat sink, depending on the manufacturer it will come with thermal film or a paste that you must apply. Make sure you have the instructions handy for installation as it will vary depending on your brand of processor.

After your heat sink it's time to install your RAM. Grasping each corner firmly press your first stick into the slot labeled "one". You may have to press harder than you may imagine to ensuring the RAM is seated properly. You can verify this by listening for two loud clicks as the locking arms secure it in place. If you have more than one stick, press them into the slots consecutively following the initial.

Your motherboard may be ready to install but your case is not. First off you need to remove the left side door and retrieve the baggie full of goodies (lots of screws) and instructions. If you have a more expensive or unique case, you should review the instructions for anything that may need to be set up in addition to a typical build.

First install the I/O faceplate for the back connectors, again press it in and listen for the click. Next you will have to install the standoffs, in most cases they are a brass colored screw with a male and female end. Set the motherboard aligned with the faceplate into the case, aligning the holes in the motherboard with the holes in the case. Remember where the holes are and install the standoffs; it is very important you do not install them into the wrong holes as they can ground out the motherboard and down your rig. Grab the corresponding screws and slightly tighten them, make sure you **DO NOT** over tighten; this too can damage your motherboard. Remember that rectangle paper weight you left in the box? You know the thing that reads "motherboard manual", don't be "that guy that wishes he did" and thoroughly read it as you will be referencing it throughout the rest of your build (now is a good time to check for jumpers that may need to be set on your mother board).

Next is your power supply, make sure to position your case so that you cannot drop it onto the motherboard (chances are power supply shaped holes aren't covered by the return policy). The side with the switch faces out; slide it into place and secure from the outside. Refer to the motherboard manual and attach all applicable connectors to your board.

There will be several wires coming from your case that need to be attached to the motherboard. Don't worry it's much less complicated than it looks, they are all labeled as well as the motherboard. The labels on the motherboard may be difficult to read, reference the manual again and put them in their place.

The video card is a fairly easy installation. Remove the PCI slot shield on the back of the case, opening a spot for the card. The Video card is a special PCI device as it will click into its slot (ensure the locking arm is completely flush with the card after the click); secure with a screw. Newer video cards may require a connection to the power supply and some of the more expensive cards may require more than one. For all other PCI cards simply slide into place and secure. (If your motherboard has an onboard video card and you are installing an additional card, you will have to disable the onboard card in the BIOS.)

If you're a music nerd like me & someone who soaks up all things British music, because American music is getting more than disappointing, you will note the striking similarities in Florence & The Machine's style & that of another English singer, Bat For Lashes. *Ceremonials* is heaven recorded. Instead of just looking these songs up on YouTube, I stopped mid-review & bought it on iTunes. You should do the same. I rate this album 9 out of 10, easily. ❖







The wait is almost over for some of you. On December 20, 2011 the newest MMO (Massively Multiplayer Online) game hits the stands...Star Wars: The Old Republic. This game was developed by BioWare and LucasArts and features a storyline that occurs thousands of years before the familiar characters we know today: Darth Vader, Stormtroopers, and those dirty stinky Rebels Han, Luke and Leia. You chose either the Republic or Imperial side and from there you get to choose one of several classes. Republic players have Jedi, Trooper and Smuggler characters available to them while the Imperials have Sith, Bounty Hunters and Agents.

Race is limited as are the customization options of your toon. Does this sound a little like something you might have played before? It should. BioWare was famous for its rich graphics and incredible story telling in Knights of the Old Republic I and II. In TOR the storylines are just as compelling and the graphics are not too shabby either. However, I found during the Beta Testing that it looked a bit cartoonish. Also, the game is story line driven. It is not a sandbox MMO. This is great if you are a casual gamer, you will have tons of content that you can solo.

There are instances geared for groups and of course PvP or Player versus Player zones. The game is open world and you can wander around at your leisure. Unlike the previous Star Wars MMO, Star Wars Galaxies there is limited crafting and almost no social character skills outside of a few emotes. Several other Beta testers likened it to a Star Wars skinned WoW clone. Perhaps it is. However, there are two items which may really pique a gamer's interest; you get a companion and voice acting.

Yes, I said voice acting. Every main NPC, your companion and you has a voice and it really brings the storylines to life. Dialog is all spoken and well-choreographed. I am also impressed with the companion. Each class has its own and they were put into the game to complement your skills. Ranged players get tanks, Tanks get healers, etc. This makes it easier for the casual player to navigate the game. But the quests get harder over time so there is still no guarantee that you are going to live through an encounter.

Guilds are possible in the game so there will still be all of the social interaction some players, like me, crave. There will be an in game voice chat or you can use others like Ventrillo. Oh, and did I mention at a relatively early part of the game you get your own ship which becomes the focal point of your adventures.

Will I play this game when it comes out? The answer is yes. Why? Because I have a great number of friends in the guild scattered around the world whom I like to hang out with, and this is the only Star Wars MMO for now. Will I play it long term? I just do not know at this stage. I found the controls easy and the learning curve shallow. However, the game seems too scripted for my taste and I really have no desire to re-roll a toon at end game just to experience a different facet. We will see.

Also, I am a bit skeptical about a game that has garnered over 90 awards before it has been publicly released. This seems a little presumtuos, kind of like giving Obama the Noble Peace Prize. I am not saying he didn't earn it or this game isn't that great, I just think we need to see what the masses think once it has been run through the ringer for a while. With a lot of the MMO's going Free to Play this one may follow suit. I expect it will be \$15 a month though. There are currently three pricing options for the pre-order with exclusive items that really turn sweet at the highest level.



Next up are your drives (HDD/SSD and optical), refer to your case's instructions as this can widely vary from case to case. Once they are secured connect them to the power supply. You should not be using IDE in this era but if you are, make sure you set the jumpers, master and slave respectively (main/secondary). For SATA and SATA2 drives simply connect the cord from the drive to the motherboard. Now your optical drives will come with a cord that will need to be connected to your motherboard or sound card; reference the instructions if necessary. (If your motherboard has an onboard sound card and you are installing an additional card, you will have to disable the onboard card in the BIOS.)

Double check everything and make sure you have your power supply switch in the ON position. Connect all of your peripherals, plug into a power strip, hit the power button and pray that a tiny little condescending explosion didn't just go off inside your case. If you make it past the splash screen, Congratulations! You have successfully built your own computer! Yes you may now pat yourself on back. However, it is a very real possibility (especially if this is your first build) that it may not start up on the first go. One way to look at this situation and one of the main reasons you chose to build a computer is now you are capable of fixing it! Yay! (Not like you have a choice at this point.)

There are many, many different things that can cause your computer to not boot. I will only be referencing a few. At the very least first time builders should have a tech savvy buddy within phone's reach, if not, a nearby computer for troubleshooting purposes would be sufficient. If you hit the power button and nothing happens, hopefully user error is to blame otherwise you may have a bad power supply or motherboard on your hands. You will immediately know if any of the component directly attached to your motherboard are bad or improperly installed. If this is the case you will hear a series of beeps coming from your cases speaker. Count the number of beeps and reference your motherboards user manual. In all cases troubleshooting is much easier when you have spare parts to swap out. This can be very frustrating for someone who is on their first build. This is where the tech savvy friend comes in. If you're lucky they will have a similar build to yours and will be able to swap parts, or at the very least offer some help based on their experiences. If not Google it, Google fixes everything.

Now that you've seen how simple it can be to build your own computer, I hope that you'll give it a shot. You'll have a computer that you understand completely, also easily upgradable. You can save money, and it's a lot of fun too. So the next time you need a new computer, consider building it yourself!
