Volunteerism is one of the benchmarks by which the local community judges NAF El Centro. Our Sailors are involved at the Imperial County Food Bank, in Honor Guards, funerals, fairs, festivals, charitable events, and now they have gone to the dogs.



Spearheaded by VFA-122 Detachment El Centro, Sailors have adopted the Humane Society of Imperial County located at 1575 W. Pico Avenue. Members interested in volunteering for one of the shifts can contact Petty Officers Ewing or Bravo or the Senior Enlisted Advisor, Senior Chief Bradley to sign up.

During a recent outing, Sailors helped perform some major renovations. They filled in pot holes in the dirt road with more than one ton of road grade dirt, pulled up and replaced carpets, pressure washed buildings, cleaned play pens and grounds, trimmed back the overgrowth along the fence line, washed the dogs, and delivered donated food.

Normally the shifts are two hours long Monday through Thursday



"We wanted to create an opportunity that our people can own, something they can take pride in," said Bradley.

"The shelter is not supported by any government funds. They exist solely off of donations and volunteer efforts.

This is a family friendly event, Sailors can bring their families and everybody can spend some time caring for the dogs and cats out here," Bradley explained.

"They definitely need our help," he said with seriousness. �

COMMANDING OFFICER'S CORNER



It has been a few months since I have commented here, so I'd like to use the space to update you on a few things.

First, we are 100% "on mission"; that is, thanks to your professionalism and sustained hard work, we continue to provide world class support to the combat training and readiness efforts of our warfighters, which is our number one priority and the sole reason this installation exists. I continue to consistently receive, on your behalf, exceptionally high praise from visiting aviation units on the outstanding and can-do support they receive from every NAFEC department.

We are continuing to aggressively pursue Quality of Life improvements across the base, even as we face substantial budget challenges. I expect the Lincoln-Clark housing and play areas upgrade project to be completed by the end of May. We should start the expansion of the Fitness Center in June or July. The upgrade to artificial surface for the Football Field and Track is scheduled to start this fall. The RV Park expansion (15 new lots) and upgrade project is underway, scheduled for completion in July. The projects to significantly upgrade the NEX and bring Starbucks to the Liberty Center continue to move in the right direction; I am optimistic that both will complete in 2013. I am sure all of you have seen the badly needed work that has started on Bennett Road by the County. The resurfacing of the road from the Front Gate to near the railroad track is scheduled to complete in the next week or two. And, though we have faced a number of administrative hurdles, I still expect to bring a couple of Bachelor's Degree programs to the base in the very near future.

In the meantime, budget constraints – sequestration, specifically – continue to impact us across the board. I am very aware of the reduction in availability of important facilities such as the Liberty Center, pools and Fitness Center. Please understand that these reductions are being driven down from Big Navy to all bases, that the XO, CMC and I understand the negative impacts on your lives, and that we are doing everything we can to mitigate the impacts of these reductions. As an example, it has been directed that bases with more than one swimming pool can fund the operation of only one. We are working with our Region Leadership for waiver approval to open the Large Pool on the weekends, considering our very hot climate and high demand signal for swimming recreation. We will keep you informed on that one and others and they progress. Also, our highly critical Civilian Workforce is facing furloughs in the very near future. No decisions have been finalized but, as we continue to hope that it will not come to fruition, we must be prepared if it does.

The summer heat is upon us, or at least right around the corner. Continue to do the outstanding job you do each day, keep an eye out for each other, and thank you for your tremendous contributions and dedication to the highly important mission here at NAFEC. .

Setting Boundaries – Close the Door on Energy Waste

Doors let us in and out of the building, and in and out of spaces within the building. Most doors within the building are inside the air conditioning boundary, and can be left open unless they are designated as fire doors. But one way to save on heating and air conditioning is to close doors to spaces that aren't used much, like storage areas. If they have their own source of heat or A/C, set the thermostat to the most energy-saving position (down in winter, up in summer) or off, if there's no chance of water freezing in pipes in the space.

Obviously, doors to the outside need to be closed when the heat or A/C is on. If you notice a door that's frequently left open, report it to your supervisor or building energy monitor. The mechanical door closer may be in need of repair. Or maybe the building pressure needs to be adjusted. Typically, the volume of fresh air being brought into the building should be slightly more than the volume of air being exhausted, to keep a slightly positive pressure in the building.

It's especially important that large loading doors be closed when not actively in use, if the heat or A/C is on. Report large loading doors to conditioned spaces that are frequently left open. It might be cost effective to install automated high speed doors that save energy, and improve comfort and productivity. •

GPS...Goals, Plan, Succeed


The transition assistance program (TAP) has been around as long as I have been in the Navy and has helped countless people transition to civilian life through the years. As of November 19th of this year TAP is being retired and GPS is now active.

What is GPS? It is TAPS evolved. GPS is now mandatory for all active duty members separating. GPS has been expanded one day, making it a five day course now. All service members will develop a Individual Transition Plan (ITP) to help them with planning their future beyond the service.

Service members will be required to bring the following material to GPS

- 1. A copy of their Verification of Military education and training report
- 2. Individual Transition Plan template
- 3. A copy of last five evaluations
- 4. Most current leave and earnings statement
- 5. Current credit report
- 6. Transcripts (Smart, AART, CCAF)
- 7. DOD self-service logon and E-benefits registrations
- 8. DD2648 Pre-separation counseling form

Free Anti-virus Software Available

Navy Information Operations Command (NIOC) Norfolk has put together a brochure that lists ways Navy's Sailors, civilian employees and contractors can protect their computers, both at home and at work. The brochure and free anti-virus software are available to all Sailors, DoD civilians and contractors. Only those at a .mil computer and using their Common Access Card (CAC) can download this software via file transfer protocol to their computer. However, once downloaded, the software can be saved to a compact disk and installed in home computers. NIOC Norfolk also suggests CERT's Home Computer Security website as a good source for home-cyber safety tips. ❖

A Mass Notification System, also known as Giant Voice (GV), will be installed onboard NAF El Centro in the month of May. The GV system consists of three outdoor siren towers that give the installation the ability to transmit live and recorded voice messages, tones, and music.

The installation is scheduled to begin on May 6, with testing scheduled for 20-31 May. During the test period, the system will be activated sporadically during the hours of 0800-1700 on select weekdays. All tests will be prefaced with a test message to notify base personnel. Loose Lips Sink Ships By Chaplain Smith

"Loose Lips Sink Ships". During WWII, this slogan appeared on posters across the United States in a concerted attempt to discourage careless comments that could be damaging to the Allied war effort. A salvo of words overheard by the wrong ears could send a ship to the bottom of the sea as sure as the enemy torpedo that was fired against it.

If you are a part of today's modern Navy, you've probably discovered that loose lips can still sink ships—and much more. The gossip that runs the length of a ship or base and back again has a way of causing damage among members of the command and crew, sinking reputations and relationships, taking morale to the very depths of the sea. Many of us have stories we could share of the severe damage that gossip has caused in the lives of friend and foe alike.

It is the responsibility of every member of our Navy to reverse this downward trend. And we can do so by refraining from speaking, entertaining, and/or repeating careless comments about the personal lives of our shipmates. Toward this end may we remember the following...

#1. If You Think You Know What You Saw, Think Again. I read a true story recently about a young wife of a deployed soldier who was spotted having dinner with another man. The woman and the man were seen sitting close together. Hugs were even exchanged. The rumor mill ran amuck of the obvious impropriety. "Concerned" individuals went so far as to contact the deployed husband to notify him of his wife's illicit activities.

The following was the deployed husband's response—"The man you saw was my brother. He is going through a divorce and my wife, as his sister-in-law, is doing her job of comforting and helping him through this hard time at my request."

In the end, what seemed like impropriety was altogether proper. And what appeared to be "helping" was only hurting instead. A brief conversation with the wife could have put this rumor to bed before it even began.

- **#2.** If You Didn't See It, Don't Repeat It. Given that our eye witness accounts are not always accurate, it is prudent to be principled enough not to repeat information that we didn't actually witness ourselves. While our intentions may certainly be above reproach, we may be aiding and abetting the enemy without even knowing it.
- **#3.** If You Can't Say Anything Nice, Don't Say Anything At All. This maxim served most of us well as children. It will serve us equally well as adults. When considering the question of gossip, there are always two questions that one must answer regarding the statements that we choose to make about others. First, "Is it true?" And, second, "Is it good and right?" If our words will not raise the reputation and spirit of others, then it might well be better for us to say nothing at all—true or not.

Loose lips can sink ships. Loose lips can sink lives as well. It is up to us all to raise ourselves above the rumor mill so we all don't go down with the ship. .

Burrowing Owl Survey

On 26-27 December 2012, NAFEC's Natural Resources Specialist completed the annual Christmas runway/taxiway area burrowing owl/critter survey and documented one burrowing owl living in several culvert pipes immediately adjacent to the fuel hot pits. With the high aircraft traffic common at the hot pits during flight operations, this owl presented an ingestion hazard. No other animals were found to be residing within the area that would present a significant BASH hazard. On 16 January, the owl in the area flushed upon approach; the culvert pipe was inspected to confirm that no owls, nests, or eggs, were inside; and heavy mesh screening was placed over the pipes to prevent further owl usage. ❖



The Out-of-Towners

Twice a year, photographers from around the southwestern U.S. and distant parts of the world descend upon NAF EL Centro to take part in a "Photo call."

The clubs that usually come out for this exclusive event are FenceCheck, Aviation Photographers of Southern California (APSoCal), Phoenix Spotters, Imperial Valley Friends of Photography and Arizona Aviation Photographers (AzAP) along with personal initiations to leading photographers.



Initiated in 2008, the photo calls were designed to give special access to aviation photographers who would then share their pictures with the base and with the world. This event is a low cost method for the U.S. Navy to share its message through the lenses on non-military photographers said Michelle Dee, the base's Public Affairs Officer. These talented men and women capture images from a different perspective and they help us showcase what naval aviation is capable of, she added.

AzAP has been shooting out here since 2009. According to the photo club's website, the mission of AzAP is to provide a means for Arizona-based photographers to record and preserve the southwest's rich aviation heritage, both current and historical. They also serve as an aviation-media resource for news media, museums, military, and the aerospace industry.

Earlier this year, AzAP spokesman Joe Copalman contacted the PAO about a project his club was working on. As a thank you to the many hard working Sailors on the base who helped facilitate the photo calls, they collected not only their finest images, but the ones that did the best job of visually telling the NAFEC story from over the years, to create a coffee table photo book.

The El Centro Chamber of Commerce and Visitor's bureau worked with the club to help them set up with an online print-on-demand publisher. The result is a 40 page book of stunning images showing the mission, personnel and aircraft that visit and work on the installation.

The book, titled *The Out-of-Towners* was officially unveiled at the NAF El Centro's 2013 air show. "This book was created by the Arizona Aviation Photographers club as a tribute to the men and women, sailors and Marines, allied service personnel, government and contract employees, and the members of the surrounding communities who are stationed at, detached to or work at Naval Air Facility El Centro," Copalman said.

The Out-of-Towners is available for order through www.Blurb.com, a print-on-demand service that ships your books directly to you after purchase. Softcovers are available for \$35.00, hardcovers for \$45.00, and it is also available as an eBook download for iPad, iPhone, and iPod touch for \$9.99. 

What's Up, Navy Doc?

"Hear Ye! Hear Ye! Ear Infections Can Be a Pain"

How Does an Ear Infection Develop?

Acute infections of the middle ear (what doctors call "acute otitis media") occur when there is a viral or bacterial infection in the middle ear. Normally, the Eustachian tube drains fluid from the middle of the ear to the back of the throat. Yet, if that tube becomes blocked, the fluid is not able to drain and can become infected in the middle ear. Children and infants are more likely to get ear infections than are adults because those younger Eustachian tubes become blocked or swollen more easily. Unlike other kinds of infections, ear infections are not spread directly from one person to another; however, when one person spreads either a bacterial or viral cold to another person, that spreading may indirectly lead to an ear infection in that second person.

What Are the Causes and Risk Factors of Ear Infections?

Some of the most common causes and risk factors for ear infections are:

- **Allergies**
- Colds
- Sinus infections
- Exposure to tobacco smoke or other irritants, like air pollution
- Increased saliva production during teething in young children
- Attending day care, especially with a lot of children. The more children that a child is exposed to, the greater the chance of that child getting a cold which, in turn, increases the chances of getting an ear infection

How Can Ear Infections be Treated?

Most acute ear infections can be treated at home without antibiotics. These treatments include:

- Apply a warm, moist cloth or compress to the affected ear to decrease pain
- Take over-the-counter medication for pain like ibuprofen and acetaminophen. (Remember though, do NOT give aspirin to children)

If a child is less than 6 months old and has a fever, go see a doctor. For those children older than 6 months old, see the doctor if they develop:

- Fever higher than 102.0 degrees Fahrenheit
- Significant pain or other symptoms that are not relieved with the above-mentioned at-home treatments
- If the symptoms get worse or do not improve

What Are the Symptoms of Ear Infections?

The symptoms of ear infections can depend on the age of the person affected. Infants will usually have irritability and inconsolable crying. Children a bit older might have a fever or difficulty sleeping. Although tugging or pulling on the ear can indicate an ear infection, it might not always be present. Other symptoms include:

- Earache or ear pain
- Fullness in the ear
- Difficulty hearing or complete hearing loss in the affected ear
- Headache
- Vomiting
- Diarrhea

Can Ear Infections be Prevented?

Not entirely. But you can decrease the risk of developing an ear infection with the following:

- Wash hands and toys frequently to decrease the risk of getting a cold
- Avoid exposure to second-hand smoke or other air irritants
- If possible, enroll your child at a daycare with a small number of other children to limit the exposure of colds

Tip of the Month: As we begin this new brand new year, please pay close attention to your child's ear. Through these methods of detection, you might just prevent an infection. Younger children cannot always clearly say, what is really bothering them today. As they say: There are two things certain, one thing sure; an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, but see your doctor when symptoms worsen or stay. As we experience colder weather that looms, this info may reduce trips to waiting rooms. �

Greetings again from the aspirations of a dedicated sailor!

I am pleased to share a little of my rate in the Navy and what we as Master at Arms (MA) do here at Naval Air Facility El Centro.

What I hope to create from this article is a segment for personnel on base who, if active duty military, retirees, family and civilians, would like to be more informed and connected with their security here on base. Being a native of New York City the term, "boys in blue" was no affiliation to the United States Navy but in relation to the New York Police Department and the discreet image of outstanding customer service, unity, and presence they provided for the city.

What you can expect from this article and many more to come is law enforcement topics, fun history facts, criteria for security, and even some interviews with Master at Arms and security officials here on base. Without further ado, I present a brief history of the rate and how it applies here at NAF El Centro.

The Master-at-Arms rating started out in the post-American Revolutionary War on board the ships of the United States' early Navy. Taking on many customs and traditions of the Royal Navy, the existence of the rating did not take effect until the Naval Act of 1 July 1797 (a previous Act of 27 March 1794 authorized the same, but was allowed to expire) or known as the Congressional Act to provide for a Naval Armament, which authorized the President of the United States to provide four ships of 44 guns and two ships of 36 guns each, to be employed on each ship various officers, marines and petty officers under the command of a commissioned officer as the Captain.

In the United States Navy today, an MA is the rating primarily concerned with law enforcement and good order and discipline. They serve as a military police force onboard naval ships and installations, both within the continental United States (CONUS) and outside the continental United States (OCONUS). MAs traditionally report to the Commanding Officer (CO) of the command, through the Executive Officer (XO) or Operations Officer (OPS), in maintaining good order and discipline, enforcing rules and regulations, and protecting life and property. To this day this tradition is the driving force for MAs and is being stationed here at NAF El Centro.

As some have noticed, the patrol units driving around base and even the foot patrols conducted by myself and security officers have been established as a positive influence building a base community among the civilian, military, families and law enforcement here.

Community policing provides a safer living environment and the maintenance of an orderly society.

The vision for Naval Air Facility El Centro is to be the Navy's premiere tactical training air installation-providing world class operations, world class facilities and the highest quality of life for our personnel and their families. During my tenure here, I have realized this vision is lived out every day by each individual here. With customer service being the core foundation of security at NAF El Centro, we are committed to not only upholding the law, but the mission, vision, and identity of this installation as well. •








The Sequestration of Service

Rating: R



DISTINGUISHED WARFARE MEDAL IS NO MORE

Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel has eliminated the Distinguished Warfare Medal, DOD officials announced April 15, 2013 according to an article by Jim Garamone of the American Forces Press Service.

Instead, the military will recognize service members who directly affect combat operations without being present through distinguishing devices that will be affixed to already existing awards.

"The Joint Chiefs of Staff, with the concurrence of the service secretaries, have recommended the creation of a new distinguishing device that can be affixed to existing medals to recognize the extraordinary actions of this small number of men and women," Hagel said in a written release.

DOD announced the creation of the Distinguished Warfare Medal Feb. 13, 2013.

Members of veterans' service organizations and others objected to the Distinguished Warfare Medal, officials said. The medal's order of precedence was to be just below the Distinguished Flying Cross and just above the Bronze Star. Some commentators objected that it would rank higher than the Purple Heart -- awarded to those wounded or killed in action.

The distinguishing devices can be affixed to awards at different levels, so, once written, the criteria for the awards must reflect that, officials said. For example, the criteria for affixing a device to an Army Commendation Medal would be different than those for a Meritorious Service Medal -- a higher award. ❖



LOCAL HISTORY BY TWO OLD GOATS



A recently interesting nugget discovered about the base was the existence of the "Chuting Stars" parachute team. These guys were the forefathers of today's Leap Frogs demonstration team. Formed in 1960 as an opening act to the Blue Angels, this team was specifically formed from jumpmasters at NAF EL Centro to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Naval Aviation in 1961. After the first year, they were transferred to Florida where they remained until 1964 when budget cutbacks forced their decommissioning.

Reformed in 1969 as a collateral duty assignment for jumpmasters, they performed for three more years until they were permanently disestablished in 1972.

DeCA reduces its footprint on Earth Day, every day

Earth Day may only come around once a year, but the Defense Commissary Agency focuses on being green and environmentally friendly every day.

"From the design of commissaries to the products offered inside — and everything in between," said Joseph H. Jeu, agency director and CEO, "DeCA strives to be a good steward of natural resources, to find creative ways to recycle and conserve, and reduce our carbon footprint."

During Earth Day, April 22, and Earth Week, April 17-24, commissary customers can look for extra savings on earth-friendly items such as compact fluorescent light bulbs and a good assortment of green cleaning products and high-efficiency laundry cleaning products. There are also innovative waste-reduction products such as paper towels and bathroom tissue without cardboard tubes, so there is nothing to throw away after the last towel is used. Being green even extends to DeCA's produce department, where customers can find organically grown fruits and vegetables.

"Our sales say something about commissaries and our customers," Jeu said. "Not only are commissaries committed to selling environmentally-friendly products, but our customers are committed to protecting the environment, and that's something we can all get behind."

DeCA's dedication to being green is part of an ongoing culture change, said Mark Leeper, an environmental engineer at the agency's Fort Lee headquarters. Consider, for example, the recent purchase of a dehydrator, installed at the Marine Air Ground Task Force Training Command Twentynine Palms Commissary, Calif. The dehydrator has reduced the store's waste by 86-90 percent. It converts food and paper product waste into a bio-solid, or compost, which can be repurposed.

"This process allows DeCA to reduce the number of solid waste containers at our stores," Leeper said. "That reduces the amount of money we spend on refuse services." The following initiatives exemplify DeCA's focus on conserving natural resources:

Recycling. In fiscal 2012 alone, DeCA recycled 63,000 tons of solid waste, which means about 70 percent of all recyclable materials brought into commissaries are recycled. Part of that effort involved cardboard recycling. Cardboard sold to recycling companies —instead of throwing it away — netted \$5.3 million in revenue that went into the agency's surcharge fund, which is used for renovating and building commissaries. The effort will expand beyond stores this month when a waste-sort audit will be conducted at DeCA Headquarters. The audit identifies and measures recyclables that are being thrown out and determines how the agency can improve its recycling program.

<u>Conserving water and energy.</u> Commissaries are energy-intensive facilities, and DeCA managed to save 2.3 percent in fiscal 2012. Thanks to various energy-saving features being added to its stores — when compared to commercial supermarkets, commissaries are 34.2 percent more energy efficient — the agency is moving steadily toward the federal energy goal of 3 percent annual energy reduction through 2015. Annual energy use intensity has been reduced by 20.7 percent between fiscal 1995 and fiscal 2010. In fiscal 2012, water use declined 2.7 percent.

<u>Reusable bags and CFL bulbs.</u> From fiscal 2006 to the first quarter of fiscal 2013, commissaries have sold nearly 6 million reusable bags. Customers also bought almost 6 million CFL bulbs from calendar year 2006 through 2012.

<u>More green foods.</u> DeCA continues to increase its volume of organic products. This lineup includes organic meats, produce, dairy products, baby food, and organic dog and cat foods.

<u>Greener stores.</u> DeCA recently opened its first "green" commissary, equipped with the newest energy-saving features, in Ansbach, Germany. The grand opening of the new store in Portsmouth, Va., will be the first commissary with energy-conserving glass doors on most display cases. Future initiatives include a worldwide equipment assessment to meet fiscal 2015 energy and water goals, starting Web-based refrigeration monitoring, testing low ambient "layered" and "day" lighting, establishing an energy reporting website, and providing annual computer-based, energy efficiency training for the agency's facility energy supervisors.

"Being a lean and efficient organization that uses nature's assets as wisely as possible is a goal that challenges us every day," Jeu said. "But it's a philosophy we embrace at DeCA, and thanks to the collective effort of our workforce and customers, it's something we can achieve."

Ultra-Light Aircraft being used for illegal drug smuggling

Ultra-Light Aircraft (ULAs) have been utilized by drug smuggling organizations to deliver payloads of drugs throughout the Imperial Valley in recent years. As part of a multi-faceted approach to combating this, the El Centro Sector Border Patrol has been aggressively working on a campaign to raise awareness regarding this smuggling method. By empowering our partners, the public, and stakeholders within the community with information about what suspicious activity to look for regarding illegal ULA traffic, we can work together to obstruct this form of illegal drug smuggling. Please read the following important information regarding illegal ULA activity.

- Many ULAs are flown by law abiding citizens. These citizens will be seen flying their ULAs for recreational purposes over the Imperial Valley during daylight hours.
- The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations prohibit ULAs from flying at night. If you encounter a ULA flying at night please report it immediately.
- During nighttime hours you may hear a ULA before you see it. These aircraft make a low humming sound similar to that of a lawn mower or any small engine vessel.
- In most cases, ULAs will drop off their illegal payloads from the air. The payloads will typically be dropped in makeshift welded cages and some sort of marking device like common glow sticks, touch lights, or candles will be used to illuminate the drop zone on the ground (see images). These items will typically be left behind when the drugs are picked up on the ground. Wal-Mart Plans to Hire Any Veteran Who Wants a Job

Wal-Mart, the nation's largest retailer, will announce Tuesday a plan to hire every veteran who wants a job, provided that the veterans have left the military in the previous year and did not receive a dishonorable discharge. The announcement, to be made in a speech in New York by William S. Simon, the president and chief executive of Wal-Mart U.S., represents among the largest hiring commitments for veterans in history.

Company officials said they believe the program, which will officially begin on Memorial Day — May 27 this year — will lead to the hiring of more than 100,000 people in the next five years, the length of the commitment.

"Let's be clear: Hiring a veteran can be one of the best decisions any of us can make," Mr. Simon will say in his keynote speech to the National Retail Federation, according to prepared text. "These are leaders with discipline, training and a passion for service."

In a statement, the first lady, Michelle Obama, who has led a campaign by the White House to encourage businesses to hire veterans, called the Wal-Mart plan "historic," adding that she planned to urge other corporations to follow suit.

"We all believe that no one who serves our country should have to fight for a job once they return home," Mrs. Obama said in the statement. "Wal-Mart is setting a groundbreaking example for the private sector to follow."

The unemployment rate for veterans of the recent wars has remained stubbornly above that for nonveterans, though it has been falling steadily, dropping to just below 10 percent for all of 2012. That was down from 12.1 percent the year before. The year-end unemployment rate for nonveterans was 7.9 percent in 2012.

Reducing the veteran unemployment rate was among the few veterans' issues discussed by the presidential candidates last year. It has also been central to the work of Mrs. Obama's campaign to assist veterans and military families, <u>Joining Forces</u>. Last August, her office said that private companies working with Joining Forces had hired or trained 125,000 veterans or their spouses in a single year, surpassing the group's goal of 100,000 a full year early.

Wal-Mart's foundation has consistently been among the most generous contributors to veterans' charities, committing to donate \$20 million to veterans' causes by 2015. "I take this one personally," Mr. Simon, a Navy veteran, says in his prepared text.

But the company has also been aggressive about hiring veterans because it views them as good employees, said Nelson Lichtenstein, a <u>labor historian</u> at the University of California, Santa Barbara, and the author of the book "The Retail Revolution: How Wal-Mart Created a Brave New World of Business."

About 100,000 of the company's 1.4 million employees in the United States are veterans, company officials said.

"They like military people because they have a sense of hierarchy and a commitment to the organization they are in," said Professor Lichtenstein, who has been a critic of Wal-Mart's management practices. "And that's important to Wal-Mart." In recent years, Wal-Mart has been the target of lawsuits by women, accusing the company of discrimination in salaries and promotions.

Gary Profit, a retired Army brigadier general who is senior director of military programs at Wal-Mart, said the company might not be able to guarantee that every veteran who wants a full-time job will be able to get one. But he said that because of the size of Wal-Mart's retail operation and supply chain, it is almost certain that the company could find a job — even a part-time one — close to any veteran who wanted one.

"If you're a veteran and you want a job in the retail industry, you have a place at Wal-Mart," he said. ❖





Changes in the New YearBy Jim Shinn



There will be changes in the New Year, but what and how? Many of us set New Year's resolutions. That is a good thing. To set future goals and then not achieve them, well, I really don't know how good that is. If you really want to make changes, read on. I will share what research says about what works, some personal experiences and what I have learned from successful clients from years past.

I am going to give you a list of suggestions. They are all important, and I am not sure which is more important. What powers the change for one person, may not be the catalyst for another. You pick and choose or use them all. If you do none, well don't expect 2013 to be much different than 2012. I have already achieved one goal and that was to make a 3 pointer in a full court basketball game after turning 60. Not really a big deal, but I got what I wanted. How about you?

- 1) Start small with changes. Rather than the goal of losing 20 pounds this year, say to yourself, I will lose 2 pounds a month. Small victories encourage us to do more.
- 2) Write down goals. Get them out of your head and down on paper. If we leave them in our heads, it is easy to forget them on a daily basis. If we see it, we are reminded of what we need to be doing or where need to be going (or what needs to be avoided)
- 3) Tell a positive person about your goal. If you tell a negative person, they may tell you things that just make your angry or decrease your motivation. Many a health club have personal trainers, because the individual will "pump you up" rather than let the air out of your tires.
- 4) Get support. The Good Book says "it is not good for man to be alone!" By ourselves we are more likely to plop it in front of the tube with chips or ice cream. If we have a walking or weight loss partner, we often have a personal relationship and reason to maintain the positive change of course. If we have someone to hold us accountable, we do better. We pay our bills because our collectors will always hold us accountable.
- Join a support group. If you want spiritual changes, get in a Bible study. If you want physical changes join Weight-Watchers, a walking group or a sports team. If you want to change some emotions or a behavior that is bad for your mental health, find a support group or maybe AA or Alanon. We don't have as many support groups down here in Imperial Valley, but they are worth the trip to San Diego. Suicide of a friend or family member is very painful for the survivors. When I hear of one in the community, I will often call or send them information about "Survivors of Suicide", a group that meets monthly in San Diego.
- 6) Get individual or family counseling. Counseling can help to keep the focus on the desired changes and remove some of the barriers. The counselor often has experience helping others with similar needs.
- 7) And finally, important but one I caution about, is check out the Internet. There is good information about change and there are some supportive resources available. A friend of mine had a rare cancer, and he found people throughout the country, who were going through similar treatment. He was very bright and discerning. There is a lot of nutty stuff on the web, so I would encourage activities 1-6, rather than the Internet. But if you decide to use the Net, don't go it alone. Have another person there to help you process the information.





Looking for a vacation hotspot??


