





COMMANDING OFFICER



As we get ready to begin a new year, I would like to take a few moments and reflect on all of the amazing work the NAF El Centro team accomplished in 2010. You are all truly dedicated professionals, and our year would not have been nearly as successful without the incredible amount of hard work and determination that you exert every day of the year.

Our mission at NAF El Centro is to ensure victory in combat through superior training of our aviators. Your work ensured that we were able to complete that mission this year in a highly successful manner. Through the course of the year, we hosted 81 separate detachments consisting of 615 aircraft and over 6800 personnel. We were also able to complete 68,500 airfield operations.





Easter earthquake. NAF El Centro sustained damage to the runway, tower, electrical and water distribution systems, and several buildings. The fact that we were able to operate aircraft within 48 hours of the earthquake is a testament to the patriotism and can do spirit that you bring to work every day.

Our annual Air Show was a huge success this year. We had over 40,000 members of the public here to see what you do, and to see the aircraft in action that they fund with their tax dollars. Even more importantly, the public was able to interact with the professionals that work here and gain an appreciation for the incredibly important work that you do.

Operational safety was enhanced on base due to the outstanding efforts of many of you. We were able to put new signs on the ranges to more clearly delineate range boundaries. This action alone will greatly increase safety for the public by lessening range incursions. We were also able to restripe the airfield and remove old and outdated power units from the flight line. This will ensure that aircraft operations on the tarmac will be much safer.

A couple of new buildings were added to the base. First and foremost of these is the Child Development Center. This new, state of the art facility replaces a building that was originally a temporary fix that was only supposed to last for a year, but instead lasted for over 25. A new shade structure at the front gate enables the professionals who are responsible for the security of the base to do their jobs in an environment that is much safer for them, and that keeps them from facing the worst of the summer heat.

Finally, you gave back to the community that supports us in innumerable ways. In over 23 years of active duty service, I have never lived in a community that is as supportive of a military installation as the people of Imperial County are to us. The fact that they are so supportive of us is due in large part to the role you play outside our fence line. You volunteer at the El Centro Food Bank, numerous schools, and at various events. This past year saw you play major roles in the Imperial County Aviation Day, Memorial Day and Veteran's Day celebrations, and at funeral services for our honored veterans.

As we look ahead to the New Year, please take a moment to reflect on all that you've done this past year. Each of you, military and civilian, government and contract employee, have played a role in our accomplishments. I can't tell you how fortunate I feel I am to be able to work with all of you. I often tell people that I have the best job in the Navy. The reason I tell them that is because it's true. Thank you for all you do, and come back in 2011 prepared to make it an even better year. ❖





Customer Service Detachment



CSD has undergone a number of changes during 2010. Most of these changes are a testament to the Navy's commitment to the use of cutting edge technology to optimize efficiency and mission completion. Effective January 1st 2010, all service members enjoyed a 3.4% pay raise. Additionally, there were changes to BAH rates (please visit https://www.defensetravel.dod.mil/site/bahCalc.cfm to see your current BAH rate).

Additionally, our office has successfully facilitated a smooth transition from the hard copy Enlisted Service Record to the Electronic Service Record. All personnel records can be viewed via NSIPS or BOL. NSIPS displays all personnel information that is on record with CSD. This includes your Page 4 (NAVPERS 1070/604), Page 5(NAVPERS 1070/605), as well as personal data such as education and training. The OMPF (record on BOL) displays official personnel documents that contain authorized signatures and have been electronically submitted.

Another big change that has taken place is the transition to E-leave. Now instead of routing a leave request, personnel can submit a request for leave via their NSIPS service record. This is a much faster process because it allows for quicker review and approval from your chain of command. In addition, it gives the service member the ability to check in and out of leave electronically. CSD is leading the way with technological enhancements in order to better meet the pay and personnel needs of our Desert Warriors; and the result is a more mission ready force. ❖



---- A Movie Review ----

Burlesque:

Players: Cher, Christina Aguilera, Kristen Bell, Julianne Hough, Stanley Tucci Genres: Drama, Musical

Yes I actually paid to see Burlesque; the question is should you? Honestly I was expecting a "Glitter" meets "Showgirls" debacle even with El Centro's very own Cher (Tess) co-starring. I had somehow believed that this type of film was beneath an entertainer of Cher's status. By this type of film I am mainly referring to simple plotted weak story-lined films that also debuts a musical diva. As implied earlier, I was prepared for a "Glitter" "Showgirls" fiasco but what I actually got was a "Glitter" "Coyote Ugly" mixture that wasn't half bad. Still the plot was simple, small town girl travels to Hollywood to fulfill her dreams of stardom.



The story sets off with Ali (Christina Aguilera) at work in a small town Iowa restaurant getting "punk'd" by the owner/boss who refuses to pay her. After he conveniently leaves she takes it upon herself to pay herself and raids the register before breaking into song and "breaking out" to Hollywood. The song is just a prelude of things to come as Ali was just dusting off her pipes. Following a long day of job searching Ali stumbles onto The Burlesque where she's immediately intrigued. This is where Tess makes her grand entrance with song; it's this performance that convinces Ali that she knows "What a Girl Wants." She was determined to be a burlesque girl no matter down and "Dirty" she had to get as evidenced by her waiting on tables for the night without any official hiring.

Unbeknownst to Ali, The Burlesque co-owned by Tess and her ex-husband Vince (Peter Gallagher) is in the red and going under quicker than Fannie Mae stock. The potential savior Marcus (Eric Dane) offers to buy them out but has alternate plans with the club if successful in doing so. The other character of interest is Jack (Cam Gigandet) Ali's "Genie in a Bottle." Jack is also from small town America chasing a dream but relegated to bar tending duty; not confident enough to share his music with the world he only tells Ali about it. Eventually he opens up his apartment and heart to her after she shows up at his doorstep in sort of an "I Turn to You" kind of moment.

Ali's break comes when burlesque girl Georgia (Julianne Hough - yes that Julianne Hough of Dancing with the Stars fame) discovers she's pregnant. Ali walks into the club only to discover auditions being held by Tess and Sean (Stanley Tucci) and begs for an audition with a promise not to disappoint. In the end Sean convinces Tess to give her a shot as he was sort of "The Voice Within." The mean girl of the crew, Nikki (Kristen Bell), is the so called star and resents Ali from day one but in reality Nikki is an alcoholic and loses her position because of this. Ali's big break comes when Nikki arrives late once again and is replaced by Ali. Nikki's attempt to jeopardize Ali's performance backfires as it allows her to showcase her real talent and sing. After wowing the crowd Tess rewrites the entire show after Ali, a star is born! This seemed farfetched in real world settings but I gave it a pass and went along with the storyline which in a sense is somewhat ridiculous. What gives this film merit is the onscreen chemistry between Tess and Sean as well as Jack and Ali. Each actor (including Ms. Aguilera) did a fantastic job in giving life to their character, making them believable in an unbelievable situation. The ending is sappy and predictable but I gave it a pass and went along with the storyline. With that being said, I rate this film two and a half fouled anchors out of five. •

New 2011 BAH Rates!

The Department of Defense has released the 2011 Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) rates, which take effect Jan. 1, 2011. While overall rates will decrease an average of 0.59 percent, because of the individual rate protection provision, the average change service members will see is a 1.1 percent increase.

Individual rate protection ensures that individual members already assigned to a given location will not see their BAH rate decrease. though they will receive the

increase if the rate goes up. This assures that members who have made long-term commitments in the form of a lease or contract are not penalized if the area's housing costs decrease. Any decreases only apply to members newly reporting to a location.

A typical junior enlisted member with dependents will find his/her BAH about \$39 per month higher than last year, while a senior non-commissioned officer with dependents will receive about the same amount as last year.

Three components are included in the BAH computation: median current market rent; average utilities (including electricity, heat, and water/sewer) and average renter's insurance.

Total housing costs are calculated for six housing profiles (based on dwelling type and number of bedrooms) in each military housing area. BAH rates are then calculated for each pay grade, both with and without dependents. An estimated \$19 billion will be paid to over 1 million service members in 2011. ❖

New NAVADMIN on PFA Separations

Effective January 1, 2011, members separated for failure to pass the physical fitness assessment (PFA) shall be assigned a separation program designator (SPD) code ending in either "FT" or "CR" depending on whether you fail the BCA or PRT. Due to this new policy, some Sailors will no longer be authorized to receive involuntary separation pay (ISP). For those Sailors eligible to receive a portion of ISP, will need to meet certain other requirements to receive it. I cannot stress enough the importance of staying within standards and maintaining a physical fitness program year round. For more information see NAVADMIN 420/10.

Local Military History by Two Old Goats...

Why Are There Only Four Planes at Blue Angels Park?

NAF El Centro is the winter home of the Blue Angels. The Old Goats are pretty sure we all know this. However, it has been their cold weather respite only since 1966. In those 45 years, the Navy's premier pilots have flown four aircraft

When the Blue Angels arrived in 1966 they were flying the Grumman F11F-1 Tiger. The same aircraft they had flown since 1957. In 1969 they transitioned to the McDonnell Douglas F-4J Phantom II. Then in December 1974, the Navy Flight Demonstration Team began flying the McDonnell Douglas A-4F Skyhawk II.

On November 8, 1986, the Blue Angels completed their 40th anniversary year when they unveiled their present aircraft, the McDonnell Douglas F/A-18 Hornet, the first dual-role fighter/attack aircraft, which is still serving on the nation's front lines of defense.

Prior to the Tiger, the Blue Angels flew the following aircraft: F6F Hellcat, F8F Bearcat, F9F-2 Panther, and the F9F-8 Cougar. ❖

Percy Jackson and the Olympians: 5 Book Series- Rick Riordan

I know what you're thinking....and yes these are children's books. However, this five book series is one of the most well written pieces of modern day literature. These are books that both children and adults will enjoy. Riordan produces a masterpiece that takes Greek mythology and incorporates it into a modern day environment. He integrates aspects of action, adventure, and comedy into Percy Jackson's unique journey into young adulthood. The series follows Percy and his friends as they battle a myriad of mythological creatures, gods, and demigods in order to save their camp (camp Half-blood) and ultimately save Mount Olympus. 

Geotags: Opening Yourself Up to Exploitation.

Recently, Adam Savage of MythBusters Fame, took a picture of his jeep, uploaded the image to Twitter and said he was "off to work." What he did not remember to do was disable the geotag function of his Smartphone and now we can all find his house. Yes. He compromised the location of his family and opened himself up to stalking, theft, or worse. The whole article is here: http://nyti.ms/917hRh. What exactly is geotagging? Geotagging is the process of adding geographical identification to photographs, video, websites and SMS messages. It is the equivalent of adding a 10-digit grid coordinate to everything you post on the internet. Geotags are automatically embedded in pictures taken with Smartphone's. Many people are unaware of the fact that the photos they take with their Smartphone and load to the Internet have been geotagged.

So what is the concern? Tagging photos with an exact location on the Internet allows random people to track an individual's location and correlate it with other information. How can they do this? If you use foursquare, Facebook Places, Gowalla, SCVNGR, and post pictures from your Smartphone, the more nefarious elements of society can find you. Services like MotionX and the other location-based social networking applications just mentioned allow strangers to track your movements every day. If they watch someone long enough they will know exactly when and where to find that person on any given day. By tracking movements and aggregating information, strangers can determine where someone lives and works.

Well shucks, you might be saying. What can I do now to prevent this? Simply deleting the photos you have out there might not be enough. Once it is on the web, it is out there, somewhere, forever. However, one of the simplest ways to avoid displaying too much information is to disable the geotagging function on your Smartphone. Another thing you can do is to be mindful of the items you post and the sharing policies on those sites. Of course, just like sex, abstinence is the best method for prevention! Do not post it!

What Exactly Is Article 134?

We all know the major articles outlined under the Uniform Code of Military Justice. However, one article is frequently misinterpreted. Article 134, also called the general article is frequently referred to as a catch-all. That gives the erroneous impression that to be punished; one does not have to meet certain elements of proof. In order to be punished or convicted of a charge under article 134, the act or crime must be prejudicial to the good order and discipline of the armed services. Some of these crimes may not be illegal in a civilian court; however, if the act brings discredit upon the military or is in violation of a federal law, it is considered a crime under the UCMJ article 134. Some examples are bribery, writing bad checks, failing to pay debt, fraternization, and animal cruelty (the Navy doesn't want a Michael Vick case). Crimes punishable under article 134 are classified as one of three clauses. Clause 1 offenses are those offenses which are prejudicial to good order and discipline. An example of this would be straggling or self injury. Clause 2 offenses involve conduct that brings discredit upon the armed services. An example of an offense that would fall under clause 2 is failing to pay a debt or making disloyal statements. Finally, clause 3 offenses are noncapital crimes that violate federal laws. For example, perjury or parole violations are crimes that would be classified as clause 3 offenses. When studying the UCMJ, don't underestimate the importance of article 134 or the elements needed to prove a violation of that article.

Feds Rule Caffeine and Alcohol Shouldn't Mix

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration warned four small brewing companies that the caffeine added to their malt alcoholic beverages is an "unsafe food additive".

"The FDA does not find support for the claim that the addition of caffeine to these alcoholic beverages is 'generally recognized as safe,' which is the legal standard," Dr. Joshua M. Sharfstein, Principal Deputy Commissioner said in a news release. "To the contrary, there is evidence that the combinations of caffeine and alcohol in these products pose a public health concern."

Michigan, Washington, Utah have instituted bans, and others have taken or are considering similar steps, such as New York, Pennsylvania, Indiana, Oklahoma, Montana and Connecticut. More could act based on the federal action. States are the primary regulators of alcoholic beverages and have full authority to ban alcoholic energy drinks whether by regulatory or legislative action, or through attorney general enforcement. "State-level product bans will continue to be necessary to get the products off of store shelves," Michele Simon of the Marin Institute in San Francisco, told The Washington Post.

Just before the FDA's announcement, Four Loko's maker announced that it was removing caffeine, guarana and taurine from its 23.5-ounce cans of potent malt liquor. Phusion previously announced that it was voluntarily ceasing sales in New York after officials there pushed to ban the dangerous concoctions. Two years ago, under pressure from state attorneys general and coalitions, several large brewers, including Anheuser-Busch and MillerCoors stopped marketing caffeinated products.

A year ago, the FDA announced it was investigating the safety and legality of alcoholic energy drinks. It sent letters to nearly 30 manufacturers of alcoholic energy drinks demanding that these manufacturers produce evidence within 30 days that their products were safe and indicated that the FDA would take appropriate regulatory action, including possible product seizures if these manufacturers could not provide adequate proof of safety. •

Question: Why can't I lose this belly?

"I do 100 abs exercises each day and still have a pop belly". Then the popular Myth: "You can do an exercise for a certain area of your body and fat will melt away".

You can pick up any popular magazine and they will have pictures, articles and even celebrities trying to make you believe in the "Popular Myth". Their headlines will state, "5 moves to trim, flatten, or sculpt your abs."

I regret to inform you, it is not that easy. You have to work hard and commit to these three things:


- 1. Regular exercise
- 2. Strength training

By the guidelines of American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM), you can do,



- Received CNO and SECNAV awards for FY09 in the "Environmental Restoration, Installation" category.
- Reduced base energy consumption which consists of natural gas and electricity by 1.5% of the FY 2003 baseline.
- Executed a budget of \$11.6 million to support base facilities, including the awarding of \$5.6 million on over 40 construction and repair projects.

Completed projects included:

- Hangar 7 & 8 Renovation, \$3.5M. Awarded 2/26/2009 (FY09), completed 1/31/2010. Project scope included misc. non-structural repairs/upgrades to 2 old WWII-era hangars. Scope included asbestos & lead abatement, interior painting, window replacement, restroom upgrades, lighting upgrades, hangar floor epoxy coat, etc. This provides a significant increase in the quality of life for visiting detachments working in these hangars.
- Photovoltaic Roof Systems, \$2.97M (ARRA). Awarded 7/20/2009, completed 2/12/2010. Project involved demolition and replacement of the roofs on the five (5) buildings (201, 202, 214, 4001, and 4002), followed by the installation of Solar Photovoltaic (PV) Power systems on the five new roofs. This system produces 2,300 MBTU annually and will save \$95K/yr in energy costs.
- Galley Food Prep Area Renovation, \$1.06M. Awarded 6/26/09 (FY09), completed 2/22/2010. Project scope included misc. repairs and upgrades to food prep area. Install stainless steel wall paneling; repair chill boxes; remove swamp coolers; upgrade/repair HVAC system; repair service entrance door and air curtain; restroom upgrades; roof repair. Significant improvement for quality of work environment for galley workers, which is directly related to the quality of service provided and quality of life for military personnel who use the galley.
- Blue Angel Park Desert Landscaping, \$550K. Awarded 9/28/09 (FY09), completed 3/1/2010. Project included modifying sprinkler system, replacing grass with desert landscaping and drought-tolerant plants (which apparently includes some grass). But the good news is that the project saves 2.76 million gallons of irrigation water per year.
- Whirl Tower Demolition, \$174K. Awarded 6/30/2009, completed 5/31/2010. Included demolition of an abandoned steel tower and block building on the range. The facilities were used during the heyday of the space program, but had been abandoned for decades and had become a significant public safety risk due to the presence of HAZMAT and numerous fall hazards on site. By demolishing the facilities, the Navy's liability and the threat to public safety was eliminated.
- Worked with AOC to assist in recovery from Easter earthquake, including replacing ATC Windows, \$279K. Awarded 4/5/2010, completed 5/31/2010.
- Water Treatment Plant Motor Control Upgrades, \$192K. Awarded 12/30/2009, completed 6/36/2010.
- P-211 Combined CDC/Youth Center, \$8.1M (MILCON). Awarded 1/30/2009, ribbon cutting held 8/12/2010. Design/build project to construct new combined CDC/YC to replace inadequate facilities (one was an old housing unit, other was an old fitness center). Project was completed on budget and slightly ahead of schedule. Resulted in a world class facility that will make a significant improvement in the quality of life for Sailors & their families.



Mosquito surveillance in The Naval Air Facility El Centro

Introduction:

There has been limited surveillance in Imperial County since West Nile Virus was established in California. Due to increasing complaints, mosquito surveillance program was started in Naval Air Field El Centro (NAFEC) on summer 2008 to determine the source and make-up of the mosquito populations. The program has collected thousands of mosquitoes during the season. Agriculture is present within the perimeter of NAFEC, unusual for military installation. This paper explores how agriculture may play a role in maintaining mosquito populations in NAFEC and presenting the WNV risk to military personnel, their dependents, civilians, and retirees.

Background:

- NAFEC is located in Imperial Valley Region, Imperial Co., CA.
 Imperial Valley has desert climate with over 350 days of sunshine and less than 76 mm (3 in) of rain annually. Winter temperatures from up to mid 80F to lows in the mid 40F to mid 50s F. During summer days, the dry desert heat can push temperatures well past 100F and overnight lows to mid 80F. Average annual humidity is 24%
- •West Nile Virus was probably introduced into California during July 2003 and was detected initially in a pool of *Culex tarsalis* mosquitoes collected near El Centro, Imperial County, on July 16, 2003 (Reisen *et al.*, 2004)

Methods and Materials:

 An IPM program was developed on summer 2008 to reduce the impact of mosquitoes in NAFEC. I established 6 mosquito collection stations and conducted weekly mosquito collection and identification. The methods of mosquito collection utilized are a combination of light trap with CO2.

Discussion:

- NAFEC's agricultural leases and close proximity to extensive farmland is suspected to be the main contributing factor to increased mosquito activity because of the accumulation of stagnant water.
- Based on the data collected in the past three years, the mosquito season is from May to October with the high in the months of June and a small spike in September. Despite the minimal rainfall and blistering temperatures, we suspect the increase in mosquito activity coincides in the increase irrigation occurring at the same time period.
- NAFEC's IPM program includes treating larvicides to stagnant water within the perimeter.
- Despite the potential mosquito problems, the agricultural leases within NAFEC reduces potential for dust storms which can affect air operations.
- The Branch Health Clinic at NAFEC screens and conducts serum tests for patients who are suspected to have West Nile Virus. The clinic also tests for any past or present infections. The clinic collects dead birds and submits samples that meet the criteria for testing to UC Davis Vector Control.
- Future Project:
 - To conduct a strong public education campaign.
 - Maintain larviciding of suspected breeding sites.




